
Bankside Pier opens

Old Vic re-opens for summer



181 year old theatre welcomes The Iceman Cometh from the Almeida

The Old Vic has re-opened for the summer with the legendary French mime artist Marcel Marceau in his new show The Bowler Hat.

The 181 year old theatre had been dark ever since being put up for sale last year by its Canadian owner Ed Mervish. But the surprise opening of the Bowler Hat, brought to The Cut by Bill Kenwright for an early summer season, means that gloom about the famous theatre's future has been at least temporarily lifted.

Transferring to the Old Vic later this month from Islington's

Almeida is Howard Davies' critically acclaimed production of **The Iceman Cometh**. Eugene O'Neill's bar room drama has a 19 strong cast including Kevin Spacey whose performance has been described by The Guardian as "simply electrifying" in "a superlative production".

The cast for the six week run at the Old Vic will also include Patrick Godfrey and Tim Piggott-Smith. The Iceman Cometh was playing to capacity audiences up to its last performance at the Spring Bank Holiday weekend.

Hanging Hanratty

The Bootleg Theatre Company has arrived at the Union Theatre in Union Street with Michael Burnham's Hanging Hanratty. The again topical Hanratty case is, like the younger Lucan mystery, often back in the news. Now, as the newlyformed Criminal Cases Review Commission decides whether to refer the matter to the Court of Appeal, this play is making the news itself. Hanratty case expert Sir Ludovic Kennedy describes David Taylor's production as "impressive" and campaigner Jeremy Fox calls it "superb". Other plaudits picked up on the provincial tour include "gripping" (Wiltshire Sound) and "provocative and disturbing" (Belfast Telegraph). Did James Hanratty commit murder? His brother Michael says: I am glad it is being shown. It's a pretty good play and very near to the mark." •See listing for booking details



Book Review

Blue Guide

ver 20 pages are devoted to the SE1 area in the latest London Blue Guide (Black Norton; £14.99). The author is Swedish born Ylva French who tends to know more about London than those born here. Ylva once had an office on Vauxhall so it's hard to find a mistake in her two SE1 chapters She appears up to date on every recent development as well as those pending such as the IMAX Cinema and Vinopolis. Already The Cut's Livebait and Meson Don Felipe qualify for a Blue Guide mention. The Thames section suggests a four mile circular walk from Waterloo Bridge by way of Tower Bridge which takes in a staggering number of famous landmarks. This is a thoroughly researched guidebook as you should expect from an author who once worked for the London Tourist Board.

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Exhibition Review

Not the Royal Academy!

Where do artists rejected by the mysterious Summer Exhibition selection process at the Royal Academy of Arts go? They come straight to SE1 where the Llewellyn Alexander Gallery hang the best in its annual Salon des Refusés known as Not the Royal **Academy**. The gallery (opposite the Old Vic) offers a constantly changing exhibition of over 1200 pictures -around 400 more than the official show in Piccadilly. In contrast to the real Royal Academy exhibition, admission is free. This year is the eighth show and six per cent of every sale goes to the Hallé Orchestra Appeal.

The Global View

The best view of St Paul's from Bankside, with Canary Wharf seen to the east, is from the simple room in an Inigo Jones design building alongside the Globe. Dishes in this Milburns restaurant specialising in grill are interesting. Two courses with cafetière coffee can be less than £20 a head. Vegetables are carefully cooked. Regular desserts include toffee apple pudding with cinnamon ice cream (£4.50). Good cheeseboard. Service is not rushed even during a quiet winter lunchtime so plenty of time to enjoy view and watch the tide rising or falling and boats passing a second time.

Church Focus

Holy Trinity Dockhead

Sunday 7 June is Trinity Sunday and the patronal festival of Holv Trinity Dockhead, the Roman Catholic church behind St Saviour's Dock. The present polychromatic brick building designed by HS Goodhart-Rendel and completed in 1959)(the year of his death) has a hint of the Victorian architect William Butterfield. This is apt for the building replaces an 1834 gothic church destroyed in the war along with the presbytery and a Pugin (of wallpaper fame) designed convent. This was the first Roman Catholic church since the Reformation to be built fronting a public highway. The main road once ran to the north of the church hence today's strangely long bleak wall here. The very old days are recalled with a 12th-century stone found on the site of nearby Bermondsey Abbey.
