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Elefest

celebrates creativity at the Elephant & Castle

Elefest, the annual festival at the Elephant and Castle, returns this month. It has expanded beyond film to take in performing arts.

Elefest began in 2003 as a free film festival based at the Coronet in New Kent Road. Last year's festival was based at the London College of Communication.

Now it is set to become an annual showcase for the creative and cultural diversity of the area. This year's expanded programme includes live music, photography, street dance, short films and videos alongside classic and new films from around the world. There will also be workshops and talks.

Highlights this year include the creation of a temporary photographic gallery in the subways beneath the southern roundabout at the Elephant and Castle and Corsica Studios' Friday night art event which always provides a exciting platform for artists from diverse disciplines to show their collective talents.

The programme includes free film screenings at the London College of Communication, the Coronet and the new Roxy Bar and Screen on Borough High Street.

Al Gore's polemical new film An Inconvenient Truth will be shown free of charge at the Coronet on Thursday 30 November. Energy-saving lightbulbs will be handed out at the screening.

The Charlie Chaplin pub next to the shopping centre will also be a venue for multi-media arts

Dance workshops and performances will take place in the shopping centre and the nearby Siobhan Davies Studios on St George's Road.

The spoken word programme will be based at the London College of Communication.

Queen to visit Southwark

The Queen and Prince Philip will visit Southwark Cathedral this month to unveil a memorial to the chief of the Mohegan tribe of North America.

The Royal visit is on Wednesday 22 November and will begin with a service in the cathedral in the morning.

The memorial will be in the churchyard where Sachem Mohamet Weyonomon was buried in 1736. A report in a newspaper dated 11 August says that the body was taken from lodgings and "very decently interred last night in St Mary Over's Burial-place".

When British settlers appropriated land belonging to the Mohegans in Connecticut, Mohamet's grandfather Oweneco came to England to see Queen Anne who ordered an investigation.

Her commission found in favour of the Native Americans but land was not returned. Indeed further encroachments followed and so in 1735 Mahomet came to petition the new King

However, the entire American delegation caught smallpox and died. Although the City was happy to bury the Europeans it was only the Southwark authorities who would receive the Indian chief's body for a late night burial.

Today's Lord Mayor of London will be present for the commemoration. Also due to attend are the tribal chairman Bruce Two Dogs Bozsum and other tribe members.

The traditional memorial boulder has been brought from America and carved with Mohegan symbols by Peter Randall-Page whose sculpture Exotic Cargo, a split fruit, is on Butler's Wharf.

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LOCAL HISTORY

Cuming Museum reopens

Old Town Hall, 151 Walworth Road, SE17 • Open Tue-Sat 10am-5pm; free



The Cuming Museum has reopened in Walworth Road highlighting Southwark's history.

Southwark Council's own museum is now more easily accessible having relocated from the library building to the ground floor of the old Town Hall next door. Above the museum entrance is a representation of the dog and pot shop sign which once stood above a doorway on the southern corner of Union Street and Blackfriars Road.

The basis of the Cuming Museum displays has always been the personal collection of worldwide artifacts amassed by Henry Cuming and his father Richard. Henry died in 1902 and the museum was opened a century ago this year by Lord Rothschild.

Items include 'medieval pilgrim badges' which Henry Cuming revealed to be fakes during his campaign against a thriving trade in replica antiques.

Highlighted in the gallery are Southwark's celebrities and famous writers such as Charles Dickens. Sadly the information about Mary Wollstonecraft only records her two years (1777-8) living at Newington Butts and not yet her important three years in Dolben Street (1788-91) where there is a blue plaque.

A third room has a temporary display of pictures from the art collection including an Edward Bawden print.

The original dog and pot will again be on permanent display shortly.

As I arrived at Tate Modern I was surprised by the size of the shining slides that towered high above the anxious crowd.

I observed some of my neighbouring thrill-seekers as they plunged into the steel tubes and recognised one thing they all had in common: a smile.

I decided to go straight to the top floor and tackle the largest slide first. The exhausting journey up five flights seemed to be well worth the thrill I was about to experience. Naurally, it was quite frustrating to find out after climbing so high that the slide required a ticket. After going back down to the bottom floor and hearing the announcement that the three ticketed slides were booked for the day, I was forced to retreat to the smallest two slides.

The lines for these slides were filled mostly with very small children, but with no shame I jumped in line. Like me, the man in front of me did not exactly fit in the crowd. He was in his late forties and was dressed in business attire. My dissapointment transformed back into excitement as I watched the man giggle and whoop like a child as he began his swift desent.

I waited my turn and eagerly began my adventure. Slowly at first, I picked up speed as the first turn approached rapidly. A swift jerk and another respectful acceleration were met by an abrupt halt which marked the end of the journey.

The giant playground brought smiles to faces and served as entertainment for young and old. Should the slides be made part of office buildings and tube stations as the artists proposes? For now they should remain an attraction and source of entertainment, but they could possibly be made functional in the future after some modifications.










BOOK REVIEW

Lambeth Past

Everyone will enjoy this book even if they never read it. There are some rare and fascinating pictures.

There is the Crosse & Blackwell factory on the site of County Hall. Just upstream of Lambeth Bridge is Doulton's Drainpipe Wharf.

The book drifts over into Southwark with an 1842 picture of the Falcon glass works in Hopton Street now recalled by the Falcon Point flats.

The 18th-century Rotunda is shown on the northern corner of Stamford Street and Blackfriars Road.

It housed Captain Cook's collection from Botany Bay and later William Cobbett made a speech there. It's now the site of the proposed Beetham Tower.

There is a portrait of Stamford Street resident Henry Stephens of Stephens Ink fame who had shared a house with John Keats in the Borough.

Both would have known St George's Circus which looks extremely attactive with a fine institution resembling an Oxford college on one of the corners.

The book has are useful maps which are welcome when reading that St John's Waterloo stands partly on Cuper's Gardens which ran down to the river.

The author is Hannah Renier who has lived in Vauxhall for thirty years which is maybe why there is such good material on the riverside and the Lambeth-Southwark boundary. Her absorbing book has an excellent bibliography and index.

Chambers London Gazetteer

It takes Russ Willey ten entries in his *London* Gazetteer to cover SE1.

It is interesting to find that he treats Shad Thames and Bermondsey as separate areas. Also highlighted as distinctive are Bankside, Borough, Waterloo and, of course, the Elephant & Castle.

With the Elephant he is right to be doubtful about the name being derived from the Infanta of Castile. He wisely suggests that Christopher Wren only "watched the building of St Paul's Cathedral from a house on Bankside's waterfront". We are spared the old claims that he lived in the



house by Cardinal Cap Alley. Willey also goes behind the famous riverside to embrace Peabody Square off Blackfriars Road.

In Borough there is an interesting explantion for Talbot Yard's name. If Chaucer is to be believed it should be Tabard Yard. Apparently a signwriter made a mistake in 1676 when painting a new sign after a fire.

Proof of some research is the mention of a good local history book and website at the end of each section. Bankside has Len Reilly's *Story of Bankside* and *www.London-SE1.co.uk*

This is a useful new book. Every household still without (or even with) a copy of the *London Encyclopaedia* should buy the new *Chambers London Gazetteer*.

Watercolour Masters

The Royal Watercolour Society has revealed some of its amazing collection of artwork in a new book.

The Society, based at the Bankside Gallery alongside Tate Modern, has since 1860 required each newly elected member to give a painting to the society's permanent collection which is now one of the world's foremost watercolour collections.

Artists who have contributed include Edward Burne-Jones, John Singer Sargent and Russell Flint.

The book Watercolour Masters

- Then & Now contains the choices of current Society members who have then created works of their own reflecting their chosen picture. Essays accompanying the works old and new discuss the special pictures.

The forty contributors include Alison C Musker who has been inspired by Arthur Rackham's Caen doorway to paint The Venetian Doorway. Charlotte Halliday is led by James Duffield Harding's 1841 drawing of Verona's riverside to reporoduce Custom House which looks towards Bankside.

In the foreword, honorary RWS member Prince Charles writes about Norfolk artist Ted Seago conjuring up "as if by magic, an image of a Thames barge floating in an eastuary under a dramatic sky".
