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Journey to the Centre of the Earth



A new exhibition at London Bridge and Southwark tube stations creates a fantastic Underground sensory world of food.

Journey to the Centre of the Earth follows on from Cockayne, Gayle Chong Kwan's exhibition on the hoardings around Southwark Station.

For this latest project Chong Kwan has worked with London Underground staff, Southwark College students, market traders and staff at the Borough Market restaurant Roast to create a dramatic volcanic landscape called Core in one of the passenger subways at London Bridge station and another large billboard - Hollow Earth - at Southwark. Further works are on display inside Roast

Ma vie en rose at the Young Vic

After the success of the community opera Tobias and the Angel, the rebuilt Young Vic is opening its second season with another community show.

Ma Vie en rose is based on the 1997 awardwinning film telling the story of Ludovic, a little boy who longs to be a little girl. It's described as tender, evocative and a bold exploration of childhood and identity that challenges the notion of community.

The trawl for the thirty cast members from among people living in Lambeth and Southwark, some under 10 years, began last May. The first to be chosen at auditions were told at the beginning of June and professional actors joined 10 days later.

Eileen, who applied to be in the show just a week before the deadline, has been blogging about her experience on the Young Vic's MySpace profile (www.myspace.com/theyoungvic). She writes that it a production made up of everyday people from all walks of life showing talents they probably never thought they had. "I joined because I thought it would be fun and I would have a laugh. I am achieving both. It is very exciting and innovative and inspirational for the people taking part to perform to a script that is not really a script, it will evolve as we evolve each week."

The director is Pete Harris who has directed at the Queen Elizabeth Hall and the music is by Gary Yershon.

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THEATRE REVIEW

Charles Dickens: Sparkler of Food & drink Albion at The George Inn

The Charles Dickens monoplay The Sparkler of Albion has come to Southwark for a summer run.

Lloyd Lee is a convincing Charles Dickens in the latest production of the play devised and written by Dr David Parker, former curator of the Charles Dickens Museum, and John Greco, founder of the Argonaut Theatre Company.

The evening is clearly a recreation of the famous readings given by Dickens and where better for him to do so than in a large upstairs room with its own bar at The George Inn in Borough High Street? Dickens mentions the pub in Little Dorrit. The show has references to The Borough, London Bridge and his father's time in prison nearby. It opens with with a description of young days in the blacking factory to which the young Dickens trudged over the toll gated Southwark Bridge.

The Sparkler of Albion, created from the letters and works of Dickens, is in its 16th year having been staged at Dickens' former house in Bloomsbury as well as touring Britain.

There have been three American tours which included a performance in New York's Merchant's House Museum. The late Geoffrey Harris played Dickens for the first 13 years making it Britain's longest running one man show. John Tallents followed before Lloyd Lee took over for the Southwark season.

Lee offers an intimate and at first conversational show taking the audience from the birth in Portsmouth to scenes of London by way of The Pickwick Papers (where the inn scene is probably The George), Oliver Twist, The Old Curiosity Shop and other classics.

Having won and held the audience's attention with sometimes amusing impersonations in Act I, Lee then abandons his chair for a series of dramatic readings. This is a unique two hour show which should appeal to those who love old London as well as any Dickens experts who will not be disappointed.



Summer books special

Secret Bankside: Walks in the outlaw Borough

John Constable has produced a book which could only be written by someone who has lived in SE1 for some time. He knows what is authentic and when a good story cannot be confirmed he says so.

Timber for the Globe may not have been dragged across a frozen Thames in December 1599 and dramatists Fletcher and Massinger are 'supposedly' gay. The author is less than enthusiatic about St Mary Overie Dock being home to the *Golden Hinde* replica since the original was never associated with Southwark. (It has been suggested that she should sail down to regenerated Deptford Creek where her predecessor was moored.)

The author easily finds enough real history on Bankside to fill his 144 page book. He tells us that the Slug & Lettuce stands on the footprint of St Margaret's Church and reveals the secret of how to see the head of the statue in Trinity Church Square move.

There is also a history of young ventures such as Tate Modern and Southwark Playhouse which he has written about from personal experience. He uses his special expertise (and achievement) in Cross Bones graveyard to place it in the context of history and surroundings.

The paperback is divided into themed walks which lead in and out of Bankside and overlap giving new perspectives depending on whether it is a Shakespeare, Dickens or Chaplin route.

This is a book for residents wanting to learn more about their home streets rather than passing tourists.

A Festival on the River: The Story of Southbank Centre

Published to coincide with the reopening of the Royal Festival Hall, this 'official biography' of the South Bank arts complex has plenty of local interest.

Charlotte Mullins traces the history of the site now occupied by the Royal Festival Hall, the Queen Elizabeth Hall, the Purcell Room and the Hayward from the first proposals for the South Bank Exhibition as part of the Festival of Britain to the latest refurbishment of the flagship concert hall.

Those who have known the South Bank art for a long time may find that the book's insistence on using the current house style ('Southbank Centre' with the definite article omitted and 'south bank' without capitals for the name of the area) grates somewhat.

Mullins has drawn on some of the memories submitted to the Love the Festival Hall history project during the refurbishment of the concert hall, many of them from local residents.

This is very much an official history rather than a critical assessment, but the book embraces the social, artistic, political and architectural elements of the centre's history, including the various failed building schemes of the 1990s.

The many archive pictures and maps in this book will provide hours of delight to those with an interest in the recent history of this slice of central London.

Proceeds from the sale of the book will support the centre's artistic programme.

F.B. Meyer

FB Meyer was a national figure strongly associated with Waterloo when he died 1929.

Bob Holman's biography, in the History Makers series, brings to light much Waterloo history for Meyer was twice minister of Christ Church opposite North Lambeth Station.

The church was the successor to Rowland Hill's Surrey Chapel which opened in 1783 on today's Palestra site. When the lease expired the congregation moved to Kennington Road and called the new church Christ Church. Its meeting rooms, known as Hawkstone Hall, take their name from the house in Shropshire where Rowland Hill was born in 1744.

The author reminds us how the church, with its tall spire decorated with the stars and stripes of the US, comes to be called Christ Church and Upton Chapel. The chapel stood in Lambeth Road until bombed during the Second World War when the congregation moved to Christ Church.

But more fascinating are the details about

domestic life in Waterloo at the end of Queen Victoria's reign. The book manages to explain why temperence was so important. The Cut had sixteen pubs draining family incomes and so Meyer started the Nelson Coffee House in Lower Marsh. He also managed to close 800 brothels.

With the outbreak of the Great War 760 men from the pews alone enlisted. Surprisingly, Spurgeon's Tabernacle at the Elephant & Castle was looked on with envy for its wealthy congregation and it was there at the end of the war that Meyer found his successor.

The publishers should have given this important book, based on archives held in SE1, an index.
