Vinopolis arrives in London's Larder A two and a half acre 'wine town' is set to open this month near Borough Market

7inopolis–City of Wine promises a "world tour" through twenty themed rooms from the remains of a Roman wine store to a bubble clad lift taking visitors to Champagne. This "adult-only entertainment for wine lovers' includes a ride on a Vespa through an Italian landscape and a simulated air flight over an Australian vineyard. You will have to "climb the Andes" to get from Chile to Argentina.

All this is being put together under the railway arches between Park Street and Stoney Street. Wine writer Hugh Johnson says: "I cannot think of a better place to enjoy all the pleasures of wine than the extraordinary arches of Vinopolis."

Other wine experts advising Vinopolis include Oz Clarke who

says that Vinopolis will be "a great place to entertain".

The official launch of the project is on Thursday 22 July at Vintners' Hall on the north end of Southwark Bridge where

Ambassadors from wine producing countries will be welcomed. Later in the day guests will process to Bankside where Culture Secretary Chris Smith is expected to formally open Vinopolis. The public will be admitted from 10am the following day. The entrance is at Bank End and admission will cost £10.

Meanwhile the vast size of the complex -the largest new attraction to open in the capital this year- is causing some anxiety among nearby residents as the huge banqueting areas are expected to mean large numbers of people arriving and leaving in the evenings. Already the London Tourist Board is planning to host a 600 strong party there ahead of the opening. • Tickets can be booked on-line at www.evinopolis.com

Julius Caesar at the Globe

m irst}$ performed at the Globe in June 1599, Julius Caesar opened the 1999 season. The text is spoken with great clarity and energy, allowing the humour and savagery to emerge. The staging with actors wearing Elizabethan dress covered by togas for dramatic effect, and the plebian crowd clothed in jeans and baseball caps emphasises the timeless and contemporary quality of the debate over violence, power and deadly rivalry. Caesar (Paul Shelley) sadly lacks the necessary imperial qualities to provoke the conspirators but Brutus (Danny Sapani), Cassius (Richard Bremmer) and Mark Antony (Mark Lewis Jones) delight, as do the musical interludes and final jig

Bermondsey & Rotherhithe

Standing out among the Docklands books at the Shad Thames Riverside Bookshop is Peter Marcan's fascinating Bermondsey and Rotherhithe Perceived. Without this well illustrated book about the past it is impossible for many to appreciate the present riverside. This is the second edition of a very personal view of east SE1. Recalled are the factories of Jacob's and Peek Frean's biscuits, Sarson's vinegar and Hartley's jams (in Tower Bridge Road) and Crosse & Blackwell. The Queen Elizabeth Street dray horse lowered by helicopter in 1987 is all part of what the author calls Docklands Reinvented.

Tudor rubbish dump found on GLA building site

Work on the site of the Greater London Authority building next to Potters Fields has revealed a rich Tudor rubbish dump. The greatest find is a banana skin which suggests that the fruit may have been landed on Hay's Wharf several centuries earlier than previously believed.

The items have been preserved due to the site being a waterlogged former fish farm rather than a dry

field. Pottery tankards and a bottle in a basket may have come from one of the Southwark taverns or a riverside a small display of finds, including the banana, at the Museum of London in the City.

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

Couthwark Cathedral Dbegan as a monastery and still runs a refectory which since February has been known as the Petit Café since it's now an offshoot of nearby Petit Robert. A two course lunch including a glass of wine is £8.95. There is always a home made soup such as celery and sometimes smoked salmon salad on the menu for a starter. It is table service which is unusual for a cathedral café today. Main courses can include cumberland sausage, cannelloni, lemon sole or sweet and sour Quorn stir fry.
