Bermondsey Square to host weekly farmers' market



A new weekly Saturday morning farmers' market will open at Bermondsey Square on 7 November.

It is organised by London Farmers' Markets, established 10 years ago, which now runs 16 weekly markets around London.

"All the produce comes from within 100 miles of the M25 – that's the rule," explains Cheryl Cohen.

LFM visits all the farms and producers who sell at their markets. "We try to find producers as close as we can to the market. We will have people from Lincolnshire and Somerset, and we will also have people from Kent and Hertfordshire"

Shoppers at the new Bermondsey market can expect to find 25 stalls selling meat, poultry, game, vegetables, fruit, juice, salads and herbs - but the exact range will depend on what's in season.

Although the emphasis will be on fresh produce to

use in home cooking, there will also be some secondary producers at the market. These traders are also bound by LFM's 100-mile rule, so for example a stall serving Polish-style pierogi would have to source its ingredients from 'local' farms too.

Cohen says that the recession means that people are shopping more carefully but the appetite for fresh, locally-sourced produce is undiminished. "People still have to eat and food is important to them," she says. "That's why our markets are weekly not monthly."

She believes that the prices charged by traders at Bermondsey Square will compare well with the alternatives at local supermarkets or Borough Market.

Cohen is keen to stress that farmers' markets should appeal to all sections of the community. "What I want to bring here is a very pleasant shopping experience for everybody in the area. There's something for everybody here. People will come and shop here and meet their neighbours and have a lovely experience."

The project will show every section of the Orchestra performing The Rite of Spring simultaneously 'as live' throughout the four-storey warehouse building. The public will able to sit amongst the horn players, perform in the percussion section and take up the baton and control sections of the Orchestra as they play.

Brewer's Dictionary of London **Phrase & Fable**

Brewer's Dictionary of Phrase & Fable, first published in 1870, was compiled by the Reverend E. Cobham Brewer. Russ Willey, a London author, has now produced this London version.

'Phrase' refers to idiom and the new Brewer, although declaring that his book "sets out to be far more than a dictionary of cockney slang", has come up with some forgotten Southwark names.

If you live in The Borough you are a Boro-onion. A leading person in Bermondsey is a Bermondsey Banger.

The entries are very much a personal choice with the fictional Parkwood Hill (Mrs Dale's Diary) and Walford (EastEnders) being allowed

But in a total of 2,000 entries there are around twenty entries or long mentions for SE1 including Pool of London, The Old Vic, Winchester Geese and Wobbly Bridge.

Willey risks including the Shard of Glass on the basis that work has started. But he also has Waterloo City Square which is a very long way off.

Among people are, side by side, Samuel Johnson and Boris Johnson who have both spent a lot of time working on the Southwark riverside not only writing but in second jobs. The first was briefly manager of the Anchor whilst the second is in his four year term as Mayor of London.

It is difficult to improve on Willey's excellent 2006 Chambers London Gazetteer but he has avoided repeating too much in the new book.

Great houses, moats & mills

on the south bank of the Thames: Medieval and Tudor Southwark and Rotherhithe

This book has a long title but it is full of new facts with the editors assisted by 14 top contributors.

The great houses featured are all to the east of London Bridge including Edward II's house called The Rosary on Hay's Wharf and Edward III's house in Bermondsey Wall East.

The former was on the More London site which as late as the 1980s was an ecological garden. The latter is more familiar as its remains still stand opposite the also ancient Angel pub.

The Rosary was just west of City Hall. But next door, and immediately east of Southwark Crown Court, was Fastolf Place which has a 62 pages description.

Fastolf Place was the home of Sir John Fastolf better known to us as Sir John Falstaff in William Shakespeare's plays. Falstaff lived off Tooley Street in the 1440s but his moated house still existed 150 years later when Shakespeare was spending long periods on Bankside.

Knowing how Shakespeare presented Falstaff it is interesting to read Christopher Philpotts' opinion that the knight "bullied and bludgeoned his way through the rights of existing freeholders and leaseholders" in order to expand his riverside landholding.

There is minute detail about the position of the kitchen and the relationship of the house to the Thames. The many excellent maps, in addition to photographs of digs, help one's understanding of the exact location.

There are also maps of the later period when the waterfront was covered by Pickleherring Street and Dung Wharf.

Most revealing are the bright colour photographs of 15th and 16th-century continental pottery found there.

A map of Roman London published a quarter of a century ago had just the suggestion of a few discoveries to the south of London Bridge. That view has changed dramatically.

This book collects data from from 41 previously unpublished north Southwark sites to provide the first definitive map of Roman activity in The Borough.

Recent planning restrictions on new basements due to concern about rising sea levels should be considered in the light of the maps

in this book. The Cathedral and market stand on an island with the 'Southwark Street Channel' to be crossed to reach the St George the Martyr site on a second island.

But worship, which is of course pre-Christian, was on the Empire Square site with Guy's Channel the east. That excavation changed the understanding of

Here at an important curve on Watling Street were temples, a cemetery and possibly worship of Isis.

This book brings a wealth of exciting discoveries together to suggest it was the Romans who founded Southwark by building on dry land. Those difficult channels were still damp ground when William I arrived in 1066.
