IWM London reopens

The London branch of Imperial War Museums reopens to the public this month.

The museum was closed for the first half of both 2013 and 2014 to allow major works to be carried out in preparation for the World War I centenary commemorations.

From Saturday 19 July visitors will be able to see how the museum's atrium has been transformed to a design by Foster & Partners.

The new permanent First World War Galleries feature more than 1,300 objects – including weapons, uniforms, diaries, letters and souvenirs – alongside photographs, art and film – many of which have never been seen before.

IWM promises a “multi-sensory experience” of life on the Western Front.

Bake-off bonanza

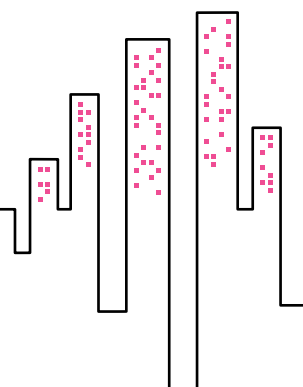

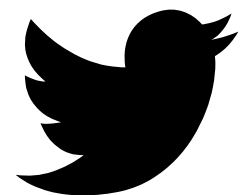
