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Chaucer 600

eoffrey Chaucer travelled abroad on numerous occasions becoming familiar with Genoa and Florence as well as parts of France. But his most famous journey was from Borough High Street to Canterbury.

The trip which gave him the material for the Canterbury Tales began in April 1388 at the Tabard Inn. The stable yard is now called Talbot Yard and is occupied by Copyprints. Upstairs in the same building is the Confraternity of St James which promotes the pilgrimage to Santiago de Compostela. This is appropriate for medieval pilgrims making for Spain would have had to go take the road to Canterbury. Southwark Cathedral is the venue for the annual costumed Chaucer Commemoration on Easter Monday and it will be the focus for Chaucer Day on Thursday 26 October marking the 600th anniversary of Chaucer's death in 1400. Chaucer's pilgrimage had been to the shrine of St Thomas of Canterbury who was murdered in his own cathedral. Days before that terrible martyrdom which shocked Europe the Archbishop visited Southwark Cathedral, then called Southwark Priory and was received by the canons. This month Southwark's Priory turned Cathedral will host the day's events.

At lunchtime Chaucer's latest biographer Richard West and novelist Garry O'Connor will be speaking on *Chaucer – Reality and Fiction* at 1.10pm. Admission is free and this will be the launch event of the Southwark Literature Festival.



In the evening, in conjunction with Southwark Festival, there will be a rare performance of George Dyson's *The Canterbury Pilgrims* conducted by Martin Neary with Gillian Keith (soprano), Robert Tear (tenor), Stephen Roberts (baritone), the choir of St John's Smith Square Orchestra and the English Festival Orchestra. Dyson's Cantata will be preceded by his overture *At the Tabard Inn*.

Chaucer was a friend of Poet Laureate John Gower who lived at Southwark Priory and is buried in the present cathedral building. He is depicted on his tomb with his head resting on his books which inspired both Chaucer and later Shakespeare.

Today's Poet Laureate, the biographer of Southwark resident John Keats, is Andrew Motion who will be giving the Southwark Literature Lecture at St George's Borough High Street at lunchtime on Friday 3 November. Appropriately it is being sponsored by Copyprints, the current occupant of the Tabard Inn site.

On Wednesday 25 October (the eve of the anniversary) the Scarlet Theatre Company will perform two of Geoffrey Chaucer's Canterbury Tales in the John Harvard Library. The Pardoner's Tale and The Wife of Bath's Tale will be presented to a promenade audience at 12.10pm, 1.10pm and 2.10pm. Admission is by ticket available in advance from the Library. Meanwhile the Isleworth Actors' Company will bring the Tales to Borough Market at lunchtimes from Wednesday to Saturday in the anniversary week.

About the Author

Euma Santos Fernandes was born in the town of Victoria da Conquista in Brazil. She graduated in Geography in 1990. During her time at university she took part in many research projects and congresses along with specialised courses within the different areas of Geography. With the highly positive reviews gained on her performance as a poet, Euma has achieved her project of publishing her first book 'A Portrait Of Emotions'. Her poems portrait the emotional intensity lived by the author, it particularly allows the readers to identify themselves, putting their emotions in context with the text's lyricism. Euma recognises that a long time in her life, she has her escapisms when writing her poems. This book has to synthesise the withdrawal of her feelings and emotions. In the midst of the daily contingencies, and with all the weaponry of living controversies and turbulent emotional life, the results are amazing confessions portrayed in great depth. The relationship with her relatives made of such inspirations, a channel to repress distance. Southwark's double festival month

mall is beautiful" is the theme for the Southwark Festival starting this month. "In this year of dramatic impression with the Dome, mammoth fireworks displays and large and impersonal events we thought that we would be noticeably different" says Festival Director Michèle McLusky. "This year you will find small and intimate occasions, rarely heard works, many small exhibitions, extra events for children and our traditional favourites." Festival Evensong at Southwark Cathedral launches the Festival

at 3pm on Sunday 15 October. Following the service a Festival preview will give a taster of what is on offer this year.

The Cathedral is also the venue for many musical events including the world premières of Gospel Train Boogie and Spinning Wheels. Lunchtime recitals are being held at the Cathedral, Guy's Hospital Chapel and St George's. From Monday 16 October it will be possible to discover 30 hidden artistic treasures in unusual places from HSBC to Neal's Yard Dairy. Meanwhile No 1 London Bridge will have a new exhibition of work by Gerald Scarfe intended

to amuse and amaze.

An important day is Thursday 26 October when the 600th anniversary of Geoffrey Chaucer's death will be marked in the Cathedral with a talk and a major musical event featuring George Dyson's *Canterbury Pilgrims*.

Chaucer Day will also be the start of the week long Southwark Literature Festival with events in both Southwark and St George's Cathedrals, on board HMS *Belfast* and the *Golden Hinde* and at Southwark Playhouse. Guests include Christopher Lee, Chapman Pincher, William Boyd and Dr David Starkey.

Female Gladiator found in Southwark

The remains of a female gladiator have been found in Southwark. Items in the grave discovered near Great Dover Street include a lamp depicting a fallen gladiator.

"I have not heard of any other discoveries of female gladiators" said Jenny Hall of the Museum of London.

The left-overs from the funeral meal were placed in the tomb to accompany the 20 year old dead woman, whose body had been cremated, into the next world. The menu included dates almonds and figs.

Since we know that female gladiators were banned by

Emperor Septimus Severus in AD 200 the burial must be at least 1800 years old. She would have done battle across the river on the site of Guildhall Yard in the City which was then Londinium. A bridge, almost on the line of the present London Bridge, linked the Roman buildings on the south bank and the cemetery site where the body was found.

However, although an inscription at Pompeii refers to women in the arena some experts are doubtful about the Southwark find.

Dr Mary Beard, a leading authority on Roman women,

says: "The evidence for this particular grave being that of a female gladiator seems thin. Lamps with images of gladiators are ten a penny in the Roman world and we have no idea whether gladiators were buried inside or outside cemeteries."

Lindsay Allason-Jones, archaeological expert at the University of Newcastle, agrees and suggests that the lady was an ordinary member of a North African merchant family.

The Grave Concerns exhibition is at the Museum of London until 29 October.

Another footbridge to link Bankside with the City

Whilst the Millennium
Bridge remains closed plans have been unveiled for another Thames footbridge linking Bankside to the City.

Attached to the existing Cannon Street Railway Bridge, the new crossing's construction cost would be at least half the final Millennium Bridge bill. It would also remain below the present height of the 1860 railway bridge and therefore not intrude on the skyline.

Work could begin early next year if the plans, by the non profitmaking Cannon Footbridge Trust, are approved by both Southwark Council and the Corporation of London.

Meanwhile the Millennium Bridge trustees are under fire from the Environment Agency for dumping rocks on the natural beach below the new bridge.

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Jury gives its verdict on Borough Market whilst Residents' Forum prepares for Inquiry

n act of economic and cultural vandalism" is how jury foreman James Todd described Railtrack's plans for Borough Market.

Sitting at Southwark Cathedral, a 'citizen's jury' drawn from local people was asked to use 12 official indicators to judge the Thameslink 2000 proposals. Five expert witnesses gave evidence.

The verdict was that the government's official yardsticks show that the Thameslink viaduct will undermine the quality of life in the Borough.

The Bankside Residents' Forum and other objectors are due to give evidence this month to the Thameslink 2000 Enquiry sitting at Bankside House in Sumner Street.

Simon Hughes MP will be appearing on Friday 6 October followed by the BRF on the following Tuesday. Also speaking will be Cllr Hilary Wines. On Thursday 12 October representatives of Neal's Yard and the Union Theatre will state their objections.

Dean Colin Slee of Southwark Cathedral is due to appear at 11am on Monday 16 October and the Bishop of Southwark will present his evidence on following day.

With many local people now being called to give their views on the Railtrack proposals it is expected that the public gallery seats will be filled in the coming weeks. The inquiry usually sits Tuesdays to Fridays.

Apple Festival in the Borough

The Borough Market **⊥** is again hosting a three day Apple Festival starting on Friday 20 October and coinciding with both harvest and the Southwark Festival. Closely involved is Common Ground, the charity involved in the maintenance of rare apple varieties. On Sunday the Lions Part theatre group will lead a procession into the Market before staging a play. Traditional variety apples from Kent will be on sale.


SE1 Snippets

Churches and Cathedrals of London (New Holland £24.99) features Southwark's two cathedrals, St George's Borough High Street, Guy's Hospital Chapel, Holy Trinity Dockhead and St Mary at Lambeth. The pictures by interiors photographer James Morris are outstanding. The author supplies handy checklists pointing out Little Dorrit in the east window at St George's and Gladstone's memorial at Guy's. 

his annual fixture at **1** the RFH shows selected works from the international press photo contest. A quick scan of the captions reads like a litany of the world's trouble spots: Kosovo, Angola, Chechnya and East Timor all feature in the display. A visit to the exhibition serves as a reminder of the wider international news agenda - the only UK story from 1999 to feature is the Soho nail bombing. But it's not all serious news - the worlds of sport, science and technology are all represented. The vivid colours of the Antarctic underwater photos are in sharp contrast to the more disturbing black and white war pictures.

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
