More development next to Tate

THE DAVID MUSSETT paper merchants building alongside Tate Modern has been sold to a property developer for more than £7m.

Crescent Capital Ltd has acquired the site. London Town, who specialise in Thames-side properties, will shortly be submitting a planning application for twenty to twenty-five flats. The sensitive site is opposite the main west end entrance to the Tate and close to two existing blocks of flats. The present small Victorian building on the corner site, at the junction of Holland Street

and Hopton Street, is a former stables which includes a tall brick chimney echoing the Tate's landmark chimney.

Staff at David Mussett, long known by the slogan 'the paper people' outside the gateway, are uncertain about a timetable for a move and their own future. News of a change of site ownership came after staff had returned from their Christmas holiday. For some years those living and working nearby have become used to being able to buy small quantities of paper at the gate. Meanwhile residents in both nearby

Bankside Lofts and riverside Falcon Point have expressed concern about the height of the new building and noise during construction work.

London Town is also developing the former Shell riverside storage depot near Wandsworth Park. The Hopton Street site was considered for possible inclusion in the original Tate Modern plan but purchase costs were thought to be too high. The completed value of the new building is expected to be £50m.

Safety fears close Waterloo's library

NORTH LAMBETH Library in Lower Marsh has suddenly closed. The shock announcement follows a health and safety report which raised concerns about both asbestos and electrical wiring.

The report, compiled by Lambeth's Environment Department, stated there was a risk to staff and users if North Lambeth Library, which is thirty years old, continued to deteriorate. It is estimated that to bring the library up to standard would take at least £90,000 but it is thought that this would only give the pre-fabricated building another three to five years of use.

Lambeth Council claims that it will move quickly to re-establish a library

service to the area. In the short term a mobile library will be parked in Lower Marsh at regular times.

The council is examining the possibility of building a new library at no capital cost to the Council by incorporating housing or office space above. The present building is single storey.

The report states that "the obvious lack of any planned or even basic maintenance on this structure over a period of some years has contributed to serious defects in several areas". Users of the library have long complained about the lack of standard reference books and erratic opening hours.

Century City at Tate Modern

TATE MODERN is set to host one of the major London art events of the spring this month with the opening of the gallery's first major temporary exhibition. *Century City* will examine key periods of creativity in world cities, from turn of the century Paris to London in the 1990s. Those who visited Tate Modern last year may be surprised to find temporary displays constructed in the previously uncluttered Turbine Hall to house part of the three-month exhibition, which also occupies the level 4 galleries. The price may also come as a shock to those used to wandering freely around the gallery – an adult admission ticket for *Century City* costs £8.50, although the collection displays will still be free.

Last month it was announced that Iwona Blazwick, head of Tate Modern's exhibitions and display, has been appointed director of the Whitechapel Gallery. Sir Nicholas Serota was Whitechapel director, boosting its reputation, before moving to head the Tate.

Blazwick is going to the Whitechapel just as it celebrates its centenary. She arrived at the Tate in 1997 and was part of the core team who planned the current display at Tate Modern and its forthcoming exhibition programme including the ambitious *Century City* show.

Commenting on *Century City*, Iwona Blazwick says: "The art world used to be about Paris, Berlin and New York. But there's a new feeling in the West that we should think more globally and that there are multiple modernisms rather than a single modernism".

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Bridge closure planned

TOWER BRIDGE is to be closed to both vehicles and pedestrians later this year for repair work.

The 107 year old crossing, built only for horse-drawn traffic, is in need of renovation. The moving parts of the 1,000-tonne twin roadway spans which open to allow vessels to pass, are becoming misaligned and there is concern that the bridge could be seriously damaged if corrective action is postponed. The work was to have been undertaken last autumn but the new provisional date is October 2001.

The need for repair work comes as fears are being expressed about the prospect of extra traffic using the bridge to avoid the planned central London congestion charge. The Corporation of London, who owns the bridge, is considering restricting the bridge to walkers and cyclists. "Tower Bridge is one of the most recognised symbols in the world and should not be put at risk" says a Corporation spokesperson.

Free theatre ticket scheme launched by Young Vic

SE1 RESIDENTS are to be eligible free tickets to plays at the Young Vic, as part of a scheme made possible by sponsorship from Ingenious Media. The scheme's first show will be *A Raison In The Sun*, starring Lennie James. Theatre Director David Lan says: "If you don't like it there is an interval and you don't have to come back. It's a no-risk offer. But we have enough confidence in our work to believe that once people are in the theatre they won't want to leave."

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Book Review

London: The Biography

IT WAS the London historian and writer Peter Ackroyd who identified the Express Newspapers building by Blackfriars Bridge as being on the site of the 'dark satanic mills' in Blake's Jerusalem. Ackrovd's latest book London: The Biography (Chatto £25) has many fascinating references to Lambeth and Southwark. He is alert to all the latest research and praises Borough High Street as being rich in Roman sites - a claim few would have made 25 years ago. But once, as the author notes, SE1 "remained relatively unknown to other Londoners, except as a source of disquiet". Looking at the literary associations along the riverside from Paris Garden to Pickle Herring Stairs, Ackroyd concludes that "perhaps there is something in the air of Southwark which encourages the transaction between reality and imagination". •london.se1shop.co.uk

1940s House at the IWM

THINK WHAT you like about the TV series but its setting, reconstructed at the Imperial War Museum, is a valuable footfall into the past. Azzurro: a secret on the South Bank

UCKED UNDER the

Waterloo to Charing Cross railway is one of the South Bank's best kept secrets. From the outside, Azzurro looks like an overcrowded bar. But inside it opens up into a very atmospheric restaurant, with good quality Italian food at affordable prices. The brick walls, flagstone flooring, lofty ceilings and wooden benches should result in a cold and soulless atmosphere, but someone has done something artistic with the lighting and produced a surprising cosiness. Upstairs is bright and airy, but for those who prefer an intimate atmosphere, there are tables in caverns and cubby-holes downstairs. Mercifully, the bland background music doesn't deafen the diners. Generous starters are priced in the £4-£5 range. Pasta and pizza main courses range from £5-£8. The pescatore pastas are to be highly recommended, although, sadly, the excellent pesto pasta range has been recently removed from the menu. The meat dishes are slightly more expensive, but provide some necessary variety. The range of wines is limited to five red and five white, but feature some good quality basics in the £10-£16 range. Service is friendly but proceeds with typically Italian languor: let them know if you are in a hurry and they will respond cheerfully. It is a good family restaurant in the day and lively for couples in the evening. Finally, a plea from an Azzurro regular: please bring back the Calzone (pizza in a cornish pasty shape, stuffed full of mixed melted cheese), but not until I finish my diet.

On to pastures new...

With the retirement of Michèle McLusky in December, Trustees and staff felt it was an ideal opportunity to evaluate what Southwark Festival had been doing and where it should go next.

The first stage of this evaluation was a Community Consultation held last month where we encouraged stakeholders, users, funders and community representatives to contribute to a wider discussion of the Festival's future. Hosted by the Trustees of the Festival at Winchester Walk, the day was facilitated by Andy Mitchell of Southwark Arts Forum. Delegates were asked to consider the larger strategic plans of the Festival so questions like "Who is the Festival for?", "When should the Festival happen?", "What should the Festival include or do?" were discussed.

The morning began with smaller groups identifying the strengths and weaknesses of the Festival and addressing opportunities and threats for the organisation. The biggest strength for the Festival was felt to be its track record and its history of providing a good quality service. Weaknesses suggested were that Southwark Festival concentrates too much in the North of the Borough and ought to do more to

work further to the South. Opportunities included stronger links with other organisations, initiatives like Black History Month and tie-ins with Bankside arts venues like Tate Modern and the Globe. Threats were seen to be from other festivals and that over-expansion of the Festival could mean a reduction in its quality.

Groups also considered what they thought should be the Future Vision of the Festival and which three key priorities they would give to the Festival in the next 12 months. Suggestions for a vision ranged from being an Autumnal Festival that included internationally acclaimed artists but also showcased the work of local creatives, to a year long provider of street theatre throughout the borough.

All of these suggestions have certainly given the Trustees and staff food for thought during our continuing evaluation over the next few months. This will be one of the first functions to be held in the new building which is part of the Southwark Cathedral Millennium Development to be officially opened after Easter. The annual meeting will take place in the early evening and all those who join the association this month will be eligible to attend. The occasion, which will bring together businesses on Bankside, will mark a major milestone in the growth and influence of the BTA in London's fastest growing area. More details on 020 7407 8830.

BTA examines tower plan

BTA members will be meeting this month in the Robens Suite at the top of Guy's Tower to examine proposals for an even higher structure at London Bridge Station.

If approved the 1,280 foot London Bridge Tower would not only be London's tallest office block but also Europe's. It beats Canary Wharf by 800 feet.

The tower would stretch 80 storeys into the skyline to taper like "a shard of glass" according to the developers. The plan is for the building to contain offices for 10,000 technology workers, a hotel, flats and indoor gardens. The design is by Italian Renzo Piano whose other projects include the New York

Times building.

If the application is successful then work, which will include demolition of the existing office block currently occupied by Pricewaterhouse Coopers, could begin next year with completion possible by 2005.

HAMLYN & THE FESTIVAL HALL Lord Hamlyn, who has given £2m to the Labour Party, is to have part of the Royal Festival Hall named after him. The honour follows Lord Hamlyn's larger, but less controversial, donation of £17m to the South Bank. As the Royal Festival Hall prepares to mark its 50th birthday in May there are moves to name the main performance space used by orchestras as the the Hamlyn Auditorium. However, Lord Hamlyn is particularly interested in plans to build a new concert hall for 350 people and a British Film Institute centre on the car park alongside Jubilee Gardens. One of these may be named after the benefactor. The principle of prestigious projects carrying the names of their benefactors is already well established in Britain, Europe and the United States. Lord Hamlyn's donation is seen as the key to the success of the £200m project which has already secured £25m from the Arts Council and £12.5m from the Heritage Lottery Fund. The balance is expected to come from other private donors and commercial developers seeking to build on the site. The arts complex will include a new film theatre, an office building, a commercial multiplex cinema and refurbished Hayward Gallery, while two new tower blocks would house a hotel and luxury flats.

DENYS LAS DUN Just weeks after the death of Denys Lasdun his most famous building is celebrating its first 25 years. The National Theatre was opened in 1976 by the Queen. The grand opening came after 125 years of planning and false starts. At one stage the foundation stone was laid by the Queen Mother opposite the Victoria & Albert Museum. The arrival on the South Bank was preceded by 12 years lodging at the Old Vic. As part of the 25th anniversary events the NT is running a poll to determine the most memorable play from each year. Voting has begun and closes on Monday 12 February. Vote online at www.nt-online.org or in person at the National Theatre. The results will be revealed as the celebrations begin next month.
