
The Long View of London

A NEW permanent exhibition called *The* Long View of London will open in Southwark Cathedral this month as part of a £10m Millennium development.

Housed in the former Chapter House buildings, this unusual exhibition traces the history of Southwark by way of the famous changing view recorded through the centuries from the top of the cathedral tower. New technology will allow visitors to take 'a long view' of London, and especially Southwark, past and present. Remote control cameras at the top of the tower will show today's panorama contrasting with the historic views by such artists as Wenceslas Hollar. A recorded 360 degree view of life on London Bridge in 24 hours passes before the visitor in just 8 minutes. Both the exhibition and the audio guide have commentaries featuring Wanamaker, Prunella Scales, Timothy West, Peter Barker and Tommy Steele.

Also opening in the new buildings are an affordable price restaurant and a shop with specially commissioned Southwark products. The cloister style courtyard is on the site of the original cloister in use when Southwark Cathedral was a riverside priory. The old and new buildings are separated by an ancient alleyway which will reopen as a glazed street called Lancelot's Link.

Looking ahead to the opening Dean Colin Slee says: "We are confident that the new visitor facilities will set a standard for quality and value which will



be a benchmark for other cathedrals."

The new complex opens on Sunday 11 March. Admission to the exhibition (open daily 10am-6pm; Sunday 11am-5pm) is £3; concessions £2.50. There will be no charge for viewing the cathedral or cloister courtyard.

Plans unveiled for Sainsbury's site

SAINSBURY'S HAS announced that its proposed supermarket in Stamford Street will open in 2003. The site for the Sainsbury's Central supermarket is the corner of Rennie Street where it will be part of a new development of the island site bounded by Blackfriars Road, Upper Ground, Rennie Street and Stamford Street. The existing buildings are to be replaced with a complex which includes a 19-storey office block on the site of Drury House opposite the Express building. The plans for the new building will see it extend out over the east end of Stamford Street to replace the flower bed traffic island. Included in the scheme is a small park on the corner of Stamford Street and Upper Ground.

However, there is concern about the height of the building which will rise above not only Ludgate House but also the Oxo Tower. The influential River Thames Society has already received an advance report about the possible impact on the river.

The new Sainsbury's supermarket will be opposite the site of the Sainsbury's shop which closed amid much regret by residents 25 years ago.

A planning application is being submitted to Southwark Council later this month. As reported earlier by in **SE1**, Sainsbury's headquarters is relocating this summer to Holborn Circus where a new building will include a supermarket.

Century City: the verdict

AN EXPLOSION of 20th century art has arrived at Tate Modern. Century City brings art from nine world cities and nine different decades of the last century to Bankside. The Parisian art shown from the earliest decade is the relatively familiar cubism and fauvism of Picasso, Braque and Gris and the happy note of Derain's Waterloo Bridge which has been lent by Madrid.

Other works are less known; I especially enjoyed the cultural creativity of Lagos from 1955-70, brought to an end by the Biafran civil war. Notable were *Journey* by Jacob Lawrence, coloured like Nigerian fabric, and the huge *Four Screens* (1966) by Adebisi Akanji, where thoroughly modern motorised figures are entwined in Romanesque-like tendrils.

The Bombay 1992-2001 exhibits have added poignancy due to the recent earthquake. Shilpa Gupta's sentiment-express.com is a comment on the uncertainty of communication transmitted through a third party and on the recently developed callcentre sweatshops established for western banks exploiting Indian cheap labour. But as a late Valentine gift you can order a love message to be transcribed in India and transmitted, in your choice of colour, style and scent to your loved one, if you are one of the ten randomly selected winners.

In London 1990-2001 SE1 appears in photo montages by Henry Bond and Liam Gillick and Gillian Wearing's candid video installation shows shoppers the Walworth Road. In Inventory (Archive) black and white photocopied press cuttings tell the story of Bankside from the 1976 GLC days of No Offices to the present. In fact I wonder that a copy of in SE1 was not itself included!

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Kathleen and May restored

THE MUCH missed Kathleen and May fishing vessel, which was a familiar sight in St Mary Overie Dock before the Golden Hinde arrived, has been fully restored to sailing standard. She was towed down the Thames from Southwark to Gloucester Docks where she was spotted by visitor Stephen Clarke from her home port of Bideford in Devon.

The Duke of Edinburgh is due to visit the *Kathleen and May* later this month when she will be moored at Bideford's Town Quay. Prince Philip first saw her in Devon in the 1960s. For Stephen Clarke it was love at first sight and he has spent £750,000 on saving Bideford's famous fishing boat. Last month 15 shipwrights were working on her ready for the big day. Later the 100 year old *Kathleen and May* will sail round Lundy Island before her visit to Ireland where a big welcome is planned.

Ken steps in to County Hall row

MAYOR OF London Ken Livingstone used his strategic authority powers for the first time to veto a major development near Waterloo Station. He has directed Lambeth Council to refuse the application by developers Frogmore to build on both the GLC island site at the end of Westminster Bridge and behind the Lying-in Hospital. The plan involved spanning the road with the development.

There is much support for the move by residents who claimed that the plan was out of keeping with County Hall and the early 19th-century hospital building. Nearby St Thomas' Hospital is willing to reopen the old hospital provided there is rear access.

The Waterloo Community Development Group has long insisted that the building would be a departure from government guidance. Frogmore is believed to be considering an appeal to the Secretary of State.

SE1 Snippets



The Millennium Bridge can only accommdate 164 people before the wobble is triggered claims new research. Engineers Arup are expected to carry the cost of the additional £5m dampers now being fitted. A grand re-opening is being planned for December when a giant party will celebrate final completion just inside the first year of the Millennium.

BANKSIDE PIER

Bankside Pier, bypassed by river operators, looks set to have a boat service next year. Tate Britain has won the go-ahead for a new pier at Millbank, which will allow a direct link with Tate Modern. Campaigners for Bankside Pier to become part of the local transport network hope that the new ferry will encourage other operators to serve Bankside.

TOWER BRIDGE

Tower Bridge has not been lifting very often this winter. An exception was for Kingfisher last month. But in March the bridge is expected to be raised for a new cross-Channel ferry. By contrast the replica Mississippi paddle steamer Dixie Queen is due back at her mooring opposite HMS Belfast from a dry dock refit in Lowestoft.

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Book Review

The Daily Life of The Queen

AS SOUTHWARK

Cathedral prepares to open its Millennium buildings it may be the moment to recall that the Millennium celebrations began in Southwark at the Cathedral. After dark on 31 December 1999 the Queen arrived in Southwark Street to visit the Crisis homeless shelter before going into the Cathedral to light the Millennium Candle. Her Maiesty set off for the Dome from Bankside Pier. This is recalled in the climax to The Daily Life of The Queen: An Artist's Diary (Ebury £30). The paintings are by Michael Noakes who is better known for his portraits but who has produced some wonderful pictures of people and places he saw whilst accompanying the Queen around the world during all of 1999. The revealing text is by his wife Vivien. The Queen and Duke arrived home at Sandringham at 3.15am.

A Very Private Passion

AT MIDNIGHT two likely lads rendezvous, as they do each year, on wasteland somewhere east of Borough. Brassaï at the Hayward

THE SOUL of Paris comes to the Hayward. A young Hungarian arrives, his rebirth as photographer confirmed with a new name. Assuming Brasso, his own birthplace, he thus liberates himself from ever returning. Paris is a glitterball for all with talent or time to plunder. With the insinuating eye of the photo-journalist, Brassai's disappearing act persists, conjuring night-voids of atmosphere and people crossing paths of savage intent and intimacy. Illuminating that which "through habit we no longer even notice", the street lamps discover ghostly days; life accedes to death from a window. Here's Picasso in his studio, yet Brassaï never possessed one.

Swoop on illegal traders Just days after new local legislation came into force Lambeth Council took tough action to clear the Thames riverside of unlicensed traders. "We shall keep up the pressure for as long as it takes to rid the area of their illegal and exploitative activities." says Councillor Roland Doven, Chair of Lambeth Council Licensing Committee. He was speaking shortly after Lambeth Council Street Trading Team mounted its successful swoop on illegal street traders on the South Bank around the London Eye and Jubilee Gardens. The operation, planned and implemented in close cooperation with the Metropolitan Police, netted 15 hot dog and caramelised peanut trolleys, two souvenir stalls and a giant 18-foot long burger trolley. This caravan was so big that it had to be taken away on a breakdown lorry. The Council is due to ask a magistrate to subject the seized vehicles to a forfeiture order. Eight police officers and eight council officers took part in the daylong raids, working in teams of four. The crackdown was the latest in a series of blitzes aimed at clearing the entire Lambeth riverside from County Hall to the borough boundary near the Oxo Tower. "These traders are unlicensed and their wagons are ugly eyesores" says Roland Doven. "Their wares are frequently unhygienic and a health hazard. They indulge in aggressive hard sells and they rip tourists off."

Bankside coach ban The long awaited coach ban on Bankside came into operation last month. This now means that there is an official ban on coaches entering and parking in streets between St Thomas' Hospital and London Bridge. There are also No Waiting regulations on the north bank being strictly enforced by the City of London and the London Borough of Tower Hamlets in an effort to end congestion around the Tower of London. The coach ban will be highlighted on maps being issued to coach drivers and tour guides. Tate Modern is encouraging all visitors to travel by public transport and not by car.
