Council consultation on illegal trading

Residents and shop owners angered by licensing proposal

SOUTHWARK Council is to respond to the numerous complaints about illegal trading on Bankside by asking for residents' views about riverside trading.

This spring complaints have reached an all time high with a sudden increase in ice cream vans and burger sellers at weekends. Cooking smells and noisy generators have been making Saturdays and Sundays a misery for many residents in new riverside flats. Badly hit by disturbance are those many long standing residents who live at Falcon Point to the west of Tate Modern. They have endured a man selling noisy bird song toys as well as buskers. Loud noise has also become a problem for those living near the Millennium Bridge where the steps underneath have been adopted as an unofficial busking pitch complete with a sound amplifier.

Sometimes a bookstall has severely narrowed the passage below Blackfriars Bridge.

The first meetings about the problem between Council and Bankside Resident Forum representatives were held last

August. The Council is now considering making the riverside path between Blackfriars Bridge and Southwark Cathedral into a nontrading zone. A similar scheme has seen burger stalls cleared from the riverside alongside the London Eye which falls within the Borough of Lambeth. The South Bank, between the Oxo Tower and County Hall is also free of illegal traders.

However, Southwark Council's suggestion that some traders could still be licensed to use official pitches has angered many residents and nearby shop owners. Elsewhere on the 180 mile Thames Path all trading is banned.

Festival Hall celebrates 50 years on South Bank

PRINCE Charles will attend a gala concert at the Royal Festival Hall on Thursday 3 May to celebrate the building's 50th birthday. His grandfather George VI opened the Festival of Britain, which included the RFH, on 3 May 1951.

The post-war exhibition was visited by 8 million people. The great attraction was the Dome of Discovery on the Jubilee Gardens site. St John's Waterloo was restored to be the Festival church. The special Festival shops built opposite by the Hole in the Wall pub survived until recently when the site was required for the Jubilee Line works.

This month there are special displays in the Royal Festival Hall looking both back to 1951 and ahead to the South Bank's future. Visitors are being invited to give their views on proposals for improved lighting, security and access.

Special events on 3 May include live broadcasts from the South Bank on BBC London Live 94.9FM.

- "The Royal Festival Hall continues to keep alive the spirit of the Festival of Britain" says Prime Minister Tony Blair in a souvenir book Royal Festival Hall 1951-2001: Past, Present & Future. The many pictures include the riverside brewery with its landmark lion which stood on the RFH site. The much-loved lion is now on the end of the Westminster Bridge.

During a meeting inside concern was expressed about families' adult children being unable to live in the area if market rents are introduced when properties fall vacant. Consultation ends this month. The Commissioners are expected to make a final policy decision in July.

Timothy West: A moment towards the end of the play, (Nick Hern Books £15.99) is West's autobiography which tells of his first visit to SE1 in the 1950s when he went to the Old Vic to see Richard Burton playing Hamlet. A quarter of a century later West was on that same stage playing Claudius and Shylock. Last year he was the star turn at the Labour Party's centenary entertainment at the Old Vic. The long road to stardom is told in this very enjoyable book which is a record of a now lost world of hard work in the provinces as well as his achievements. The only disappointment is that this important book has no index.

Location, location, location

ANY restaurant located within 50 yards of the London Eye with a view of the Houses of Parliament doesn't have to try too hard. Shino's Bar and Grill, which enjoys just such a location, has only one black mark against it: it is always busy. But there are no signs of complacency in the cuisine, the service or the décor. Shino's is unusual in being an Italian restaurant without a sniff of Pizza on the menu. The bar area serves drinks, wonderfully frothy cappuccino and viscous espresso and a delicious range of pannini to customers perched on high chairs. The décor is very modern and airy with a feel of the Italian street café. The music is less intrusive than the external speakers on the riverside might lead you to fear and has happened to suit my personal taste every time I have been in. The restaurant proper has less atmosphere, but is more comfortable for the elderly or those with children, who enjoy the typical Italian welcome. Starters range from £3.80 to £5.50 for moderate portions and include the expected soups, brochettes and salads competently presented. The wild mushroom and walnut salad is a delight. The main courses range from £6.50 for generous, wellprepared pastas, to £11 for meat and fish dishes. The risotto marina at £7.50 is encouragingly al dente - the best I have tasted in the price range outside Italy. The wine list is not wide, but is moderately priced in the £10-20 range and includes a great Barbera and some nice Frascati. If you are worn out by queuing for the London Eve and wonder if it is worth queuing again for a table at Shino's, rest assured that you will be glad you did.

McArdle brings charisma and focus, often inciting laughter, while Fiona Bell (Margaret Plantagenet) reeks of remorse as superbly as Richard Cordery (Duke of Buckingham) does of corruption. The use or props and scenery is minimalist, with little more than a bed, a few holes in the ground full of malmsey wine, steam and dry ice, and dramatic use of the theatre space. For those who feel they must at least taste the history cycle, this is not to be missed.
