The National unveils development plan

Backstage facilities slammed by star • Powercut leaves theatre dark

THE NATIONAL Theatre's Lyttelton Theatre is to be split into two in a radical new plan to attract younger audiences to the country's premier theatrical institution.

The result will be the Lyttelton Arena, a 650-seat in-the-round space in which all audience members will be required literally to cross the stage to reach their seats and in which no one will be more than 25 feet from the actors themselves. The second venue will be an intimate 100 seat Lyttelton Loft.

Both spaces are firmly aimed at attracting non-conventional theatre audiences as well as young, up and coming writers and directors who have shied away from producing work for the National's larger theatres. There will also be an Internet café and a barbecue area as well as a bar with reasonable prices and a late drinking licence. The Lyttelton productions will also have much cheaper tickets, ranging from £8 to £18 compared to £10 to £32 for normal NT productions.

NT artistic director Trevor Nunn said: "The National has been most emphatically defined by its building – we have been challenged and sometimes trapped by it."

Nevertheless, Nunn was at pains to point out that it was an experiment and only a temporary transformation. At the end of six months, the Lyttelton will be returned to its current proscenium arch form to house a revival of one of the 20th century's greatest stage classics – Tennessee Williams' *A Streetcar Named Desire*, starring Glenn Close.

Hoping for even further change and refurbishment at the National Theatre is Dame Diana Rigg who claims that the dressing rooms are so dreadful that she feels cross every time she enters the building.

Meanwhile the National had to postpone the first preview of the controversial Mother Clap's Molly House when a transformer exploded causing a power cut.

Old Vic launches appeal

AT THE Old Vic Joan Plowright is heading a fund-raising campaign to enable essential repair work on the building to go ahead. The theatre is offering the chance to purchase and dedicate a seat in the theatre. Those coming forward include Anthony Hopkins and Kevin Spacey.

Tate Tower: opposition grows

In SE

THE CONTROVERSIAL 32-storey tower planned next to Tate Modern would "improve the public realm both for visitors to the area and for local residents" claim the developers. The planning application for the proposed £55m building, taller that the Tate's landmark chimney, is now with Southwark Council. "The new Hopton Street building will provide a significant architectural statement which underlines London's position as a leading world city" says Peter Harris of the developers London Town. However, the newly formed Bankside Residents Against Tate Tower (BRATT), who were surprised to find the plans lodged during the August holiday period, has called a meeting to oppose the application. Spokesperson Theresa Towle says that the tower would "ruin the whole amphitheatre effect of the present buildings around the Tate entrance".

Commenting on its acquisition of the site in Holland Street, London Town Chief Executive Jonathan Buchanan said: "I am delighted that we have secured this prime site."

Footprint London Handbook

FOOTPRINT'S NEW London Handbook by Charlie Godfrey-Faussett (£10.99) naturally includes two substantial sections on SE1, covering Bankside & Southwark and South Bank & Waterloo respectively. Tate Modern justifiably gets several pages, and a good range of the smaller attractions are also covered. There are some sloppy mistakes in this guide, such as the misspelling of Purdy Hicks Gallery, the inclusion of County Hall's defunct FA Premier League Hall of Fame and Clink Street's Backspace Internet provider which closed more than a year ago. Coverage of food and drink is good, though: it includes hidden restaurants like Gambia Street's Catalan Mar i Terra. Transport information is patchy, but they do mention *in* SE1's sister London SE1 website in the Directory section. A comprehensive and competent guide to London, but not the best on the market.
