New London paper to be SE1-based

LONDON'S NEW evening paper will be produced in SE1. The first rival to the *Evening Standard* for 15 years has yet to be given a name but it will be edited at Ludgate House in Blackfriars Road.

News of this £5m project has given hope to many journalists in the building that controversial plans to move some of Express Newspapers' London operations to the north of England are now on hold. The *Daily Star Sunday* production team is based at Broughton in Lancashire.

The proposed 48 page London paper will employ at least 30 journalists who are likely to be hired by the spring. A commercial director is to be appointed shortly.

A spokesperson for the *Express*'s owner said: "Richard Desmond feels London is a great and diverse city which has suffered for too long from having a single monopoly supplier of its own newspapers."

The new evening paper will be free like *Metro* which is distributed by Associated Newspapers, owners of the *Daily Mail* and *Evening Standard*, in the mornings at stations.

Staff at Ludgate House are understood to have already produced two dummies with the working title *Evening Mail* as the masthead.

In 1995 the short-lived *Tonight*, distributed on Fridays at stations, was produced from offices in Southwark Bridge Road.

Next Spring the *Standard* will have competition five nights a week.

Waterloo Time Bank launched

THE WATERLOO Time Bank, a mutual volunteering project, has been launched to develop and strengthen community participation in the SE1 area.

"Already one participant has earned time credits by playing the piano at a sing-song at a sheltered accommodation in Waterloo" says Claire Navaie of the SE1-based New Economics Foundation. "Another spent her time credits on help with her English and a third is earning time credits by helping pensioners with their gardens.

"Since the Waterloo Time Bank was launched last month at St John's Church over 70 hours have been exchanged. That's 70 hours of people spending time together, sharing skills and building community."

A paid broker links people up matching peoples skills with people that need the skill. Every hour a time bank participant spends helping another participant they earn a time credit. One hour equals one time credit. Equality is a core value of time banking as everyone's time is worth the same.



TfL announces bus improvements in SE1

SEVERAL BUS routes serving SE1 have seen major improvements as part of Transport for London's investment in the bus network.

The 63 bus route now runs 24 -hours along the entire route from Kings Cross to Crystal Palace. During the night the frequency is every 30 minutes. London Transport Committee Chair Users Suzanne May said: "The improvements to route 63 are a further indication of London Buses' commitment to make the network a real alternative to the car.'

Last month the number of buses on the 100 route, linking Shadwell to the Elephant & Castle was also improved. Route 1 (New Oxford Street-Canada Water) and route 168 (Hampstead Heath-Elephant & Castle) have also seen increases in frequency. Route 243 now serves Waterloo seven days a week.

THE THAMES PANORAMA

LONDON SEEN FROM THE River

Misha Anikst and William Underhill Riverscape Publishing £9.99


Designer Misha Anikst has produced a long photographic panorama of the River Thames from County Hall to Tower Bridge. Turn the strip over and there is a panorama of the north bank from the Houses of Parliament to the Tower of London. Some will find this too unwieldy to take out on a riverside walk but it will provide endless fun at home checking on buildings seen across the water. The text is by American journalist William Underhill who seems to have a good grasp of history and dates in the well subbed captions. Buy two copies and pin them up on the wall for regular pleasure.

ACCORDING IO QUEEN EY Beryl Bainbridge

Abacus £6.99

This is fiction but a story based on well-known lives. Samuel Johnson spent so much time in Southwark that he was said to have been the temporary landlord of the Anchor. It was his friendship with Bankside brewer Henry Thrale that drew the great dictionary compiler across the river from the City. Thrale's vivacious wife Hester is the leading character in this story of sexual tension set against the background of Georgian London. Andrew Marr describes the book as "convincing and authentic". Now in paperback it is a book to buy for oneself as well as others to fill holidays hours.

THE MAN WHO DREW LONDON Gillian Tindall Chatto £16.99



The man who drew London is Hollar and London is the City of London. He gave us the famous 17th-century drawings of the City's church spires clustered around the old St Paul's Cathedral. The cathedral was still huge despite having lost its spire during a thunder storm in Elizabeth I's reign. He captured the SE1 view of the City just before the Great Fire of London provided us with today's St Paul's.

Hollar's viewpoint was Southwark Cathedral. Here he is remembered today by a plaque put up recently by fellow Czechs although he is buried on the north bank. Even more recently the cathedral's permanent Long View exhibition has opened taking its inspiration and name from the Hollar's own work. But the artist left little about himself which made Gillian Tindall's task extremely difficult. She has made an impossible task possible by her thorough research.

ECCENIRIC LONDON Benedict le Vay

Brandt £12.95

North Southwark gets its own chapter in this book but this may be because the author is fascinated by the area's history. There is much that is unique rather eccentric. His suggested walk is called 'Ancient inns, secret bibles and bloody surgery' which should tempt the visitors who thought that there was just the Tate. Under 'Murder by gaslight and a bishop's brothel' there is some tabloid exaggeration but the list of films set in Borough Market is useful even if he does describe it as "a sort of black and white place". There are 366 pages with suggestions for outings to eccentric Dulwich, Hampstead and Wimbledon as well as the City and Westminster.

THE NECROPOLIS RAILWAY Andrew Martin Faber £10.99

This murder mystery is set among the tangled streets and viaducts of Waterloo and Nine Elms in 1903, at the time the original small stations at Waterloo were being redeveloped into the building we know today. Young Jim Stringer comes from Yorkshire to London to better himself on the railways.

He starts as a cleaner and hopes to work up to driver. But he is sent to work on the Necropolis railway, taking the dead and their mourners to the cemetery at Brookwood. The antagonism of his colleagues and mysterious disappearance of his immediate predecessor, together with the colourful detail of railway life in the days of steam, create a powerful and creepy chill. The Necropolis station can still be seen today in Westminster Bridge Road and the railway track followed within Brookwood Cemetery. Perhaps this thriller illuminates some of the darker deeds of its history.

FINGERSMITH

Sarah Waters Virago £15.99

This book was on the Booker shortlist and Sarah Waters is the Sunday Times Young Writer of the Year. The setting for much of the story is Southwark with the rest of the tale upstream on the Thames around, probably, Marlow. The story is clever but of most interest is the author's claim to undertake meticulous research. This makes the opening scene at St George's Circus sometime in 1862 and domestic life in Lant Street off Borough High Street particularly fascinating. How correct is the layout of lanes between Sue's house and the railway? Certainly the main character's frightening run across the bridge to the Strand brings Victorian London alive.
