"A sad day for Bankside"

TATE MODERN TO GAIN 20-STOREY NEIGHBOUR AS RESIDENTS' APPEAL FAILS

"IT IS a sad day for Bankside" said Tate Director Sir Nicholas Serota on hearing that the 20 storey development is to rise alongside Tate Modern.

Members of Bankside Residents for Appropriate Development have lost their High Court bid to halt the scheme in Hopton Street.

An appeal by residents who fear their homes will be blighted by the project was rejected by the High Court.

The site, once a paper warehouse, was sold to developers London Town for $\pounds_{7.6}$ million in December 2000. Planning permission was refused by Southwark Council in October 2002. But the developers appealed and an inspector held a public inquiry and overturned the council's decision.

BROAD had argued that earlier planning procedure was so flawed that objectors did not get a fair hearing, and that planning permission for the block should be quashed.

They had also argued that their right to the enjoyment of their property under the European Convention on Human Rights would be breached if the tower is built. It was argued that it would significantly affect residents at Bankside Lofts and Falcon Point. Whilst expressing sympathy, Mr Justice Collins ruled: "The inspector has not erred in his approach to the balancing exercise required by the planning legislation."

Speaking later Sir Nicholas said: "The public invested £135m in the creation of Tate Modern. The tower will have a detrimental impact on the quality of the space that surrounds it and the approach to the gallery for millions of visitors each year, not to mention the impact on nearby homes."

Members of BROAD are considering whether to take the case to the Court of Appeal.

MP takes up SE1 postal service complaints | Royal visit

NORTH SOUTHWARK & Bermondsey MP Simon Hughes has met London SE1 Forum contributors suffering from the poor postal service.

During the meeting at the Blue Eyed Maid, Simon Hughes recalled that he officially opened the Mandela Way sorting office a decade ago. He has promised to make a return visit with the list of complaints which he is also making available to the Post Office Chairman. Many of those present reported cheques, credit cards and books going astray. One person brought along a letter which had just arrived having been posted three months ago.

A number of the SE1 residents confirmed that they were now using addresses of relatives or offices outside the area for important letters. In one case this involves a six mile round trip for collection.

Also present was a

television researcher working on a programme about lost mail and SE1's high level of dissatisfaction with Royal Mail.

The MP is due to call another meeting at the end this month when the Royal Mail will be invited to respond to complaints and the results of an eight day monitoring exercise.

Near-fatal stabbing at the Anchor Bankside

POLICE ARE still appealing for witnesses to a stabbing at a riverside Bankside pub that could have been life threatening, but for a fraction of a millimetre.

The attack occurred at the Anchor at Bank End at about 11.30pm on Tuesday 6 January. Police officers have obtained CCTV images taken in the area and placed a board outside appealing for information.

A group of youths approached a 24-year-old man and his friend as they were drinking in the pub and started up a conversation. One of the group suddenly leaned over and grabbed the chain from the neck of the 24-year-old man. Others in the group punched him about the face and stole his mobile phone.

As the victim struggled with his attackers, he was stabbed in the back. His friend, a 30 year old man, was also assaulted during the struggle but did not require hospital treatment. The victim was taken to a local hospital where his condition is now believed to be stable.

DC Paul Edwards of Walworth CID said: "It is a miracle the victim survived such a vicious attack. The doctors tell us: a fraction of a millimetre and it could have been very serious.

"The pub is a very popular venue and I'm sure there would have been several people still around at that time who may have seen something of the incident, or seen the suspects arriving or leaving the area.

"The group of suspects consisted of mainly male black teenagers, aged between 17 and 20. There were about three girls following close behind them but we do not know if they were involved in the incident."

SUBWAYS WERE in use at the Elephant & Castle in 1911 according to Christopher Jones' book Subterranean Southwark (Past Tense £3.50). This was when 38 vehicles a minute used the junction and the LCP site was known as Rabbit's Corner.

Today there are few public lavatories but here there is a list of conveniences with opening dates. One in Southwark Street was built in 1895 by George Jennings of nearby Holland Street who exported WCs to Argentina. This was the time when church crypts were cleared of bodies. Following a mass reburial from St George the Martyr, a notice went up: "Dry basement to be let - apply Field & Sons.'

There are 115 pages packed with information including the intriguing suggestion that the River Neckinger had connecting channels to Vauxhall making SE1 into an island.





Borough Music School needs your help

EVERY SATURDAY (and Monday after school) children gather at Charles Dickens School for both individual and group musical activities. The school gives individual lessons up to examination grade 4, in keyboard, violin, clarinet flute, guitar (and brass if requested). There are also recorder and percussion groups. Places are in great demand.

Parents and friends hear their work at the end of term concert. There are solo, small group and recorder group items, and the children gain great confidence in performing, besides demonstrating to parents and friends what they can do. Many pupils have progressed to more advanced music making at the Centre for Young Musicians at Morley College, or been offered individual lessons when they reached secondary school.

The Music School was set up in 1995, chiefly for primary age pupils who wished to learn an instrument but whose parents could not afford private tuition.

However, funders do not seem to see that learning music is a continuous process. Once one course or programme has been offered, the funding stops, but the children want to go on learning. Unless further funds are available by March, the school will have to close or reduce its operation considerably. Ideas for funds and support are welcome; and if you wish to hear the children perform, the concert is on Saturday 27 March at 11am at Charles Dickens School. •T 020 7525 9002
