THE focus for the D-Day 6oth anniversary is SE1 where there is the major exhibition and a Royal British Legion Parade.

The D-Day exhibition at the Imperial War Museum tells the story of the biggest and most complex military operation in history. The objective was the defeat of Nazi Germany and included are the personal memories of British soldiers on the beach, a secret agent behind the lines and even a German defender.

To mark the anniversary the IWM is also offering the chance to travel on land and water in an DUWKS (or 'Ducks') amphibious craft which played a vital role in the Normandy landings. The £24 fare (conc £20; child £11) includes admission to the Cabinet War Rooms and HMS Belfast in the Pool of London.

HMS Belfast played a leading role in the Normandy landings supporting the British and Canadian dawn assaults on the beaches and was one of the very first ships to open fire on German positions.

The ship's six-inch guns will again be fired on Sunday 6 June at 11am when there will be a Remembrance Service on the Quarterdeck attended by veterans of HMS Belfast. At 2.15pm on Sunday 6 June there will be a march of 29 Royal British Legion banners along Borough High Street through Borough Market. The parade starts at 2.15pm and will be led by a band. A service follows in the Cathedral at 3pm as the HMS Belfast guns are again fired.

Britain at War in Tooley Street is offering free entry to over 60s (with a paying adult) during June. On Wednesday 2 June ex-servicemen from Bomb Disposal will give short talks at 12 noon and 1pm. Children will get free entry on 12 & 13 June as part of the West End at War event in Leicester Square.

Former community centre to house creative training centre

THE former Borough Community Centre in Southwark Bridge Road is to be transformed into a £3.4 million cultural and creative industries training centre.

It is suggested that the involvement of organisations like ITV London will add value to the training by providing input from industry professionals into course design, providing workshops on career paths and master classes, as well as possible opportunities for work experience placements.

The centre on Southwark Bridge Road, a Victorian building which originally housed a public library, has been empty for more than four years since Southwark Council closed the community centre for safety reasons. It housed a range of local voluntary groups and community activities and a popular cafe operated in the basement. At the time of the closure a campaign was mounted to reopen the centre but it was ultimately unsuccessful.

Elephant Links SRB programme has funded the capital works to restore the historic building with the aim of helping local people access employment in London and Southwark's rapidly expanding cultural industries.

Union Street might not be part of most people's definition of the Elephant and Castle area, but it is part of the extended regeneration area designated by Southwark Council.

Olympic torch relay

THE Olympic torch is due to pass through SE1 on Saturday 26 June on its way from Wimbledon to The Mall.

Olympian Kriss Akabusi said: "It is a massive honour to be chosen to take part in this historic torch relay. Having competed in the Olympics I understand the power of the Olympics and to be able to carry the torch as it passes through my capital city will be an amazing experience."

The route is expected to include the South Bank where a huge fireworks display celebrated London's successful shortlisting to host the Olympic Games in 2012.

The Real Greek comes to Bankside

THE expanding Real Greek restaurant chain comes to Bankside next month with the opening of a branch on the ground floor of Riverside House, Ofcom's headquarters building next to Southwark Bridge.

The Real Greek – which offers regional Greek homestyle cooking – is the brainchild of Bermondsey resident Theodore Kyriakou, co-founder of the Livebait chain which began in The Cut.

In December the Hoxton-

based Real Greek was purchased by the Clapham House Group, the restaurant company headed by former Pizza Express chief executive David Page. Clapham House intends to expand the format to about 30 sites, with the aim of doing for Greek food what Pizza Express has done for pizza and pasta.

The Real Greek will join Zakudia and the Eat cafe at Riverside House. It will be next door to Pizza Express's Bankside restaurant.

New bus stop for Borough High Street

A NEW southbound bus stop is to be installed in Borough High Street opposite the Slug and Lettuce pub.

For over a year bus stop H on Borough High Street – the only stop between London Bridge and Borough tube station – has been temporarily moved further down Borough High Street, close to John Harvard Library. This was due to junction improvement works at Union Street which would have caused buses to block the junction had the stop remained in its previous location, endangering pedestrians and causing an obstacle to traffic.

However for passengers coming out of London Bridge station wanting to catch a bus south to the Elephant, Camberwell or Peckham, it has been a real inconvenience and a very long walk – especially in bad weather.

Transport for London has agreed to install an additional southbound stop outside 101 Borough High Street close to the exit from the Jubilee line at London Bridge. The temporary stop near the library will become a permanent location.

ITV Weather leaves the South Bank

THE final ITV weather forecasts to be recorded at the London Television Centre on the South Bank were broadcast last month.

Production of the ITV National Weather - and forecasts for ITV's London region - is being transferred to ITN. Presenters Martyn Davies, Sian Lloyd, Chrissie Reidy and Robin Lermitte are now based at ITN's Gray's Inn Road headquarters.

The move follows the transfer of ITV's London regional news service from the South Bank to ITN at the beginning of March.

The London Television Centre in Upper Ground – best known as the base of LWT – houses the newly merged ITV plc's headquarters.

book review

The Small house in 18th Century London

THE Small House in Eighteenth Century London by Peter Guillery is a delightfully thorough book and reveals much about SE1's history. The frontispiece shows lost timber houses in Ewer Street, the flyleaf is a drawing of William Blake's house in Hercules Road and the dust jacket is a colour photograph of a house in Lower Marsh. The chapter on Southwark and Bermondsey runs to 44 pages packed with illustrations and maps. The latter show St George's Fields making the Borough and Bermondsey like neighbouring country towns between river and countryside.

Photographs capture timber houses dating from maybe the 1690s in Colombo Street; the building next to The Wheatsheaf in Borough Market is revealed as early 18th-century and a three-wheel milk cart is seen outside Peggs Dairy in Sumner Street. This is an invaluable and fascinating book.

Romeo & Juliet Shakespeare's Globe

THE Globe's 2004 season of Star-Crossed Lovers would hardly be complete without Romeo & Juliet. But, given this is Shakespeare's most populist and well-known play, could the company of men and women players bring it off the page and into life? I wasn't disappointed.

A humorous, tongue-in-cheek rendition made the famous balcony scene fresh again; and the beguiling Globe worked its usual magic elsewhere – such as the moving death of Mercutio, ably played by James Garnon.

Of course, the great thing about the Bard is the timeless relevance of his work. Romeo & Juliet's central theme of love breaking out between warring tribes is highly evocative of the Palestine-Israeli conflict. At the end of the play, as the rival families realise the tragic cost of their feud and reach a reconciliation, long-overdue there is modern-day pathos in the closing line – 'For never was a story of more woe, than this Juliet, and her Romeo.'

THE restaurant Tas has been pleasing customers for three years with its location at 72 Borough High Street. The excellent food and charm of Tas can also be found at two other locations in SE1: The Cut and New Globe Walk.

The name Tas comes from the traditional Anatolian cooking pot used to prepare the casseroles which make up a large portion of the menu. The restaurant offers vegetarian dishes along with the main casseroles and meals from the grill. Starters, including hot and cold soups, hot starters and salads, range from £3.25 to £4.25. The kalamari with walnut sauce was quite delicious. Main meals and casseroles are priced from just under £7 to about £14.50. Incik, lamb served on the bone, was delightful and proved to be reasonably filling.
