BOROUGH Market barber Mike Hobbs is to push a market barrow from Brighton to London. The event is inspired by the memories of potato porter Bill Spring who recalls competing with porters from Covent Garden and Spitalfields in 1962.

Originally the race was from Borough to Brighton but this time Mike and ten friends have decided to reverse the route. They are leaving Brighton at 4am on Sunday 7 November and aim to be at the market by early evening.

The 1962 time was 11 hours 13 minutes but the 2004 team is not expecting to break the record. Although Mike is a former marathon runner, Bill Spring and his colleagues were active athletes and boxers.

Lotto live at Tate Modern

THE National Lottery's 10th birthday celebrations are to be held at Tate Modern with the first ever National Lottery Day on Saturday 6 November.

Tate Modern's riverside forecourt will showcase performances by an array of Lotteryfunded talent and a Good Causes maze will also tell the personal stories of some of the many thousands of grant recipients. Matthew Pinsent's Olympic gold medal will be among the attractions.

A spectacular light show is planned for the evening when the National Lottery draw will be broadcast live from Tate Modern along with the first ever Helping Hand Awards. The draw will include a £10 million jackpot-only Birthday Draw



County Hall will be cleared of installation art by such artists as Damien Hirst and Tracey Emin and filled instead with the more traditional medium

of painting. Opening in January, The Triumph of Painting will mark the gallery's 20th anniversary (though it has only been on the South Bank since 2002) and will feature established painters Martin Kippenberger, Peter Doig, Marlene Dumas, Luc Tuymans, Jorg Immendorff and Hermann Nitsch.

Announcing the radical change, millionaire collector Charles Saatchi declared that painting, and not the video, installations, or photography favoured by the Young British Artists, was the most effective medium.

Saatchi said: "For the last ten years, only five of the 40 Turner Prize artists have been pure painters. "We think it's time for a painting survey, looking at established international artists and later on in the year, the younger new young painters.'

County Hall's wood panelling will be refurbished with white screens and its rooms will be re-designed to make space for larger paintings. Works by Emin, Hirst, the Chapman brothers and Sarah Lucas will not return to the South Bank until 2007, after a probable international tour.

Environment prizes for SE1 schools

Installation art out, painting in

CHARLES Dickens Primary School and St Saviour's & St Olave's Secondary School have each been awarded cash prizes of £2,000 in recognition of their environmental work.

The award is a three year challenge to schools, organised by the Mayor of London and Capital Standards, to develop children's responsibility towards the environment.

The event was a chance to celebrate the success of some of the projects that pupils have been involved in - from designing and planting apple and pear orchards to compiling waste and energy audits in their schools. Pupils took part in an interactive

environmental quiz, played music with instruments made from scrap and got a chance to make their own adverts to promote recycling.

Prizes were also handed out to children who used the Golden Bin, placed in their school playground, to dispose of their litter responsibly.

Mayor of London Ken Livingstone said: "I would like to commend the hard work of all the schools in the borough which took part in the first year of the London Schools Environment Awards and look forward to seeing them further their knowledge of the environment in the second year of the scheme."

Simon's skyscraper summit

BANKSIDE Residents Forum is hosting a special meeting at the request of Simon Hughes MP to discuss plans for a cluster of towers in Bankside.

There are at least six proposals for tall buildings between Blackfriars Road and Park Street. A 34-storey building, higher than the Tate Modern tower, is part of a Land Securities plan for the site next to Christ Church. Land Securities is also planning a tower behind the nearby 18th-century Hopton's Almshouses.

unveiled plans for 24-storey building on the corner of Park Street and Sumner Street.

Meanwhile the House of Lords is to give a ruling on the controversial tower opposite Bankside Lofts in Hopton Street where there are already plans for a replacement for empty Samson House. There is also uncertainty over the vacant site at 10 Blackfriars Road which Sainsbury's has put on the market. Ludgate House opposite was partially vacated last month when Express Newspapers moved to the City.

The meeting is due to discuss the effect of a rise in population on medical, leisure and school facilities as well as roads.

THERE was great interest earlier this year when Collins published the Getmapping photographic map of the which Thames included riverside SE1. Now Collins has produced a brand new edition of London: The Photographic Atlas (£60). Central London has been completely re-flown and Waterloo can be seen in breathtaking sharpness in the new superscale section. All SE1 is shown at the 1:300 scale. Tate Modern's tower casts an interesting shadow as does the IPC tower. The area between these two landmarks is due to have five new tower blocks including one higher than the Tate. Those discussing the future of Bankside should look at this map. The lush greenery seen on the corner of Hatfields and Meymott Street has already been cut down for a hard surface. This is an important book for those who love London and care about the future of SE1.

Royal Festival Hall closure plans announced

181 JOBS will be lost when the Royal Festival Hall closes for major refurbishment in July next year.


The concert hall will be closed until January 2007 although it is planned to continue much of the performance programme in the Oueen Elizabeth Hall and Purcell Room, with a full exhibition schedule at the Hayward Gallery.

Work is already underway on the Roval Festival Hall transformation, with the refurbishment of level 1 on the riverside and the creation of a new building alongside Hungerford Bridge on target.

South Bank chief executive Michael Lynch

has admitted that he would consider changing the name of the Royal Festival Hall to incorporate a sponsor's brand name. "We might have some doubts about becoming the McDonald's Hall, but have to be open to ideas. We have to consider a sponsor becoming part of the name," he told The Observer last month.

A NEW Lithuanian grocers is hidden in Railway Approach at London Bridge. It's sandwiched between the betting shop and La Spezia and very near Borough Market.

Most shoppers are Lithuanian and others are often Polish Londoners buying the large Polish salami (£7). There is plenty of fish and especially herrings which come in many packages including old fashioned jars. A ready meal is herring fillet with stewed vegetables and paprika (£2.49).

Interesting cheeses include dried curd cheese.

A range of unusual biscuits (49p), honeycakes (65p a pack), bread and sweets are at very reasonable prices. The honey in jars (£3.10) is organic. The bottles of bean, mushroom and tomato soups (99p) will feed at least three people. The apple juice (£3.20) is worth it for large clear glass jar. A surprise is the Lithianian ice cream (50p). The shop is a welcome addition to SE1. The other branch is in Dublin.

Time Zones Tate Modern

TIME Zones is the Tate's first major film and video exhibition. The first film, just inside the entrance, is the most extraordinary. In 11 minutes two bored young boys in a bank cubicle start to perform what appears to be a traditional Kurdish wedding dance.

Another sequence shows artist Bojan Sarcevic walking through the alleys of Bangkok. Here are streets the tourists rarely see. But suddenly a passage looks familiar. You are tempted to watch it again to check if he has been walking in a circle.

An outstanding installation is the 12 hour film of Mexico City's central plaza on a very hot day. Wolfgang Staehle provides a live feed of a monastic building in Germany. During this exhibition we should see the trees change colour and maybe snow fall. So it is a pity that Times Zones is not free.

A range of sandwiches is available, or you could opt for a jacket potato, toasted sandwich (served with salad garnish) or a panini. Fair trade chocolate is also featured prominently. Cappuccinno is excellent value at just £1.

The balcony above the cafe offers computers with internet access (50p for half an hour). The whole building has wireless internet access, but frustratingly using your own laptop is more expensive than using one of the Living Space's PCs (£2.25 for 90 minutes).

A live display shows how much power is being produced by the photovoltaic panels on the roof; the system was installed by Lower Marsh-based Solarcentury.


