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Warhol's epic film to be projected onto National Theatre's Lyttelton Flytower

Hayward Gallery wants your holiday snaps

This autumn the Hayward Gallery is joining forces with Chocolate Films in a unique film project which aims to capture the essence of the tourist experience. In order to create a true portrait of British holidaymaking, the gallery is seeking home movies, holiday snapshots and souvenirs.

Willing holidaymakers should visit the Universal Tourist Multimedia Studio at the Hayward between 8 and 22 October where films, snaps and Super8 can be copied, souvenirs photographed and stories recorded. Visitors can even transport themselves to places far and wide by trying blue screen technology.

Selected footage and photos will be edited together to create the experimental digital film *Universal Tourist* – part reality show, part documentary, part artwork.

The film project is part of a major new exhibition, *Universal Experience: Art, Life and the Tourist's Eye*, in which 50 artists from across the world explore their experience of travelling and living in different cultures. Visitors donating film to *Universal Tourist* will receive a £2 discount on entry to the the exhibition.

Meanwhile Hayward curators have arranged for Andy Warhol's epic film *Empire* (1964) to be shown publicly in its entirety for the first time in Britain this month. The full eight hours will be projected onto the riverfront façade of the National Theatre on the four Friday nights in

Willing holidaymakers should visit the October, beginning at 5pm as the sun begins to iversal Tourist Multimedia Studio at the set and ending at 1am.

Filmed from 8.06pm to 2.42am on 25-26 July 1964, Warhol's *Empire* is one stationary shot of the Empire State Building taken from the 44th floor of the Time-Life Building. A picture postcard image transferred to film, it captures an era in which its subject was the tallest building in the world and the first to be floodlit, its flashy appearance dominating the New York skyline. The film consists of several one-hundred-foot rolls of film, each separated from the next by a flash of light, that show a city as it settles into the night.

Curator Clare Carolin says: "We're excited to be showing Warhol's film to a British audience in such a spectacular setting and pleased that so many people will witness these free screenings, even if they don't necessarily know they are seeing a Warhol film. *Empire* raises many issues relating to time and space that are also explored in the Universal Experience exhibition, and I hope visitors will come away feeling that they have been part of a unique tourist experience."

Beetham reveals Blackfriars skyscraper plan

Beetham has revealed details of its proposed 68-storey residential building on the site of Sainsbury's former HQ in Blackfriars Road.

Christian Male of Ian Simpson Architects who have devised the scheme described the plan as "a world class design" which would bring life back to the streets. Shops are planned for the site's ground floor facing Stamford Street and Blackfriars Road whilst the first floor of the main building would be an hotel.

The plan, known as 1 Blackfriars Road, includes public access to a viewing area at the top of the tower which has been designed with an inner and outer skin to incorporate hanging gardens for the towers' residents. The tower will have a public plaza at the base with cafés and sitting areas.

The 225m tower would be higher than the Gherkin but lower than than the proposed London Bridge Tower.

If completed the Blackfriars Road development will contain 218 apartments in the tower and be Britain's tallest block of flats. A low rise block which faces Stamford and Rennie Streets would contain 109 social housing units.

The Commission for Architecture and the Built Environment describes the scheme as a

bold addition to the London skyline but expresses reservations about the configuration of the family housing in Rennie Street and the large overhang of the building above the corner of Stamford Street and Blackfriars Road.

Westminster City Council is the first of the surrounding local authorities to object to Beetham's planned tower and will be citing its intrusion into the view of Horse Guards Parade from St James's Park as a major concern.

Change of plan for Waterloo skyscraper

Meanwhile, four top architectural practices are competing to design a new skyscraper for York Road in Waterloo.

Make, KPF, Allies and Morrison and Foreign Office Architects are all working on concept designs for a new office tower for the Elizabeth House site next to Waterloo Station, replacing earlier controversial proposals for a 32-storey "sail-shaped" tower.

Graham Morrison – whose Southwark Street-based Allies and Morrison practice is in the running to design the new scheme – last year dismissed the RHWL proposals as "domineering" and "elephantine".

A decision on the winning architect is due to be made in December, with a planning application to be made early in 2006.

There is tasting of old apple types from London by Brogdale Horticultural Trust and a colourful display created by Roots and Shoots, the Lambeth community gardens project who created the Corn Queene.



"Ev means 'home' in Anatolia and it has an extra special meaning for those of us who live there. A place with a warm, welcoming ambience where families and friends come together to enjoy the atmosphere, good food and drink" says Onder Sahan who's behind this Tas spin-off.

Saturday lunch at Ev is a peaceful affair with diners able to choose a seat in a restaurant or terrace free from the weekday crowds.

Three of us chose from the Cold Starters section and tried the maydanoz salatasi (£3.55), or tabule. The chopped parsley salad with tomatoes, onions, cracked wheat and olive oil had a hint of lemon juice. The Kozlenmis patlican and biber (£3.95) consisted of roasted aubergines, fresh tomatoes, peppers, parsley, garlic and olive oil.

There was also dolma (£3.95) better known as stuffed vine leaves with pine kernels, rice, sultanas and fresh herbs and all made on site along with the flat bread which is for sale next door.

We all chose the mousakka (£8.95) which comes as a generous portion in a bowl. This Turkish version has potato in addition to layers of minced lamb and aubergine topped with cheese.

All puddings are £3.45. Sutlac is rice pudding – rice, milk, rose-water, corn flour, orange rind and mazaki. Homemade dondurmalar, or ice cream, comes in five flavours and you can choose three from cinnamon, coconut, pistachio, vanilla and chocolate. Ceviz Macunu is ripe walnuts marinated with honey syrup paste served with clotted cream.

With the profusion of terrace greenery Ev could be abroad rather than under the arches behind Southwark Station.

BOOK REVIEW

Shakespeare: The Biography

William Shakespeare "might almost have been described as a gentleman of Southwark rather than a gentleman of Stratford" says Peter Ackroyd who recognises Bankside as the place to find the Bard.

Ackroyd suggests that Shakespeare may have lived for a time on the riverside near the Globe which is is likened to a football stadium since as many as 3,300 people were sometimes crammed inside. The author reveals that, unlike today, the Globe did open in the winter although performances had to start by 2pm.

Not that all were at the Globe. Shakespeare had a short run at the playhouse in Newington Butts. Later winter productions were across the river in the old monk's dining room at Blackfriars where tickets cost four pence more than at the Globe.

Southwark Cathedral is shown in its role as the parish church. Proof that players were in Southwark before the 1590s is the record of an outdoor play disturbing the solemn dirge marking Henry's VIII's death in 1547. Exactly sixty years later Shakespeare was at the church on New Year's Eve to bury his brother Edmund and pay twenty shillings for the great bell to be rung.

Then William would have seen the reclining figure of John Stow on his tomb who the following year 1608 was to feature prominently in Pericles.

Peter Ackroyd makes an important and enjoyable addition to Southwark's must-read history books.
