Fireworks to mark 400 years since Southwark's Guy Fawkes tried to blow up Parliament

The 400th anniversary of the Gunpowder Plot to blow up the House of Lords will be marked with a huge fireworks display on the river at Bankside on Saturday 5 November.

The display, preceded by street theatre, starts at 7.30pm and is presented by Shakespeare's Globe and Southwark Council.

Meanwhile, Shakespeare's Globe Theatre, the Tower of London and the Houses of Parliament are staging special exhibitions marking the 400th anniversary of the Gunpowder Plot which began and ended in Southwark.

Guy Fawkes, who was arrested beneath the House of Lords chamber late on 4 November 1605, was a servant at Montague House on the north side of Southwark Cathedral. His fellow conspirator Robert Catesby lived upstream near Vauxhall where the 36 barrels of gunpowder were stored before being rowed across the Thames to the Palace of Westminster.

The plotters aimed to blow up the House of Lords during the State Opening of Parliament in a bid to end the persecution of Roman Catholics. The new king James I had not eased laws as expected but had continued Elizabeth I's policy.



Catesby was arrested and his head displayed on the Houses of Parliament. Fawkes was held at the Tower of London where the gunpowder was taken for safekeeping. Eventually he was executed outside Westminster Hall but his head was placed on top of the gatehouse on the

southern end of London Bridge close to his old home.

The cathedral will be marking the 400th anniversary of Lancelot Andrewes' consecration as Bishop just two days before he was due to be in the House of Lords. He preached the first Gunpowder sermon in front of the King.

Guy Fawkes' lantern is displayed in the Houses of Parliament exhibition in Westminster Hall.

LOCAL HISTORY

Can you help solve the Jerwood Space mystery?



Are the Jerwood Space's flat roof and cut-off staircases the result of an aircraft taking off part of the second floor just after the end of the war? This is the long standing rumour about the Union Street building which at the time was the Orange Street School with an entrance in parallel Copperfield Street.

Jerwood Space Director Richard Lee says: "I've met a cab driver who swears he was here in the early Fifties or late Forties who remembers playing in the wreckage or the hole caused by the crash in what is now the kitchen garden area."

He knows various people who have been asked about the alleged incident but they can only recall hearsay rather than the event itself. The Southwark Local History Library does not have any records.

Imogen Lee, who is researching the building's history, is scouring the national archive and newspapers for leads.

Shakespeare and the Gunpowder Plot

Shakespeare's Globe until February 2006; daily 9am-5pm; admission £9 (conc £7.50; child £6.50; family £25.

The first ever bomb scare was 400 years ago this year when a letter was handed to Lord Mounteagle warning of a bomb under the House of Lords.

The bomb was the collection of gunpowder-filled barrels and firewood being looked after by Guy Fawkes.

The Gunpowder exhibition at the Shakespeare's Globe has barrels, firewood, a replica of Fawkes' famous lantern and fascinating information about the failed terrrorist attempt.

There is a letter to Robert Cecil from playwright Ben Jonson who lived at Blackfriars and knew Bankside well. Cecil was the chief minister and that anonymous warning letter was passed to him. As a result not only were the House of Lords' vaults searched but many arrests were made.

The gunpowder had been brought across the river from a house in Lambeth owned by

Robert Catesby. His head was to be displayed on the Palace of Westminster's roof.

Conspirator Thomas Percy had dined upstream with his cousin Lord Northumberland at Svon House on Monday 4 November. Although probably innocent, Northumberland was taken to Lambeth Palace and later in the month began a 16 year sentence in the Tower of London

Another SE1 connection is Fr Thomas Gerard, once a prisoner in the Clink, who heard Guy Fawkes' confession.

William Shakespeare, Catholic sympathiser, doing at this time? He was writing King Lear and Macbeth and weaving in cryptic references to the national crisis. At the end of The Tragedy of Macbeth, Macduff enters with Macbeth's head to utter the words: "Behold where stands/ The usurper's cursèd head". The exhibition suggests that this is a reference to Catesby's head on the roof across the river at Westminster.

The modern nearest equivalent to the Gunpowder Plot is probably the bombing of the Grand Hotel in Brighton. But it is interesting to read that James I acknowledged that the 1605 Gunpowder Plot was the work of a few fanatical Catholics and no reflection on the sentiments of the wide Catholic community. Today we are careful not to blame all Muslims for the 2005 Underground and bus bombings.

Lancelot Andrewes, the last bishop to live at Winchester House in Clink Street, was made bishop just two days before the Gunpowder

He was due to take his seat in the House of Lords on 5 November. Guy Fawkes, who had lived at the east end of Clink Street before moving Lambeth, was arrested the day after Andrewes' consecration.

There will be commemorative evensong Southwark Cathedral at 5.30pm on Thursday 3 November attended by four bishops including the Bishop of Winchester. Andrewes' tomb in the cathedral was made by Gerard Johnson who lived on Bankside and also carved Shakespeare's monument at Stratford.

This is an attractive collection reminiscences and art made by members of the Blackfriars Settlement's clubs for older people.

Four new restaurants have opened in the Borough Market area.

The one which has been most eagerly awaited is Roast which has at last opened on the upper floor of Borough Market's Floral Hall. It promises to serve the best British food from fresh ingredients purchased in the market.

The restaurant is the project of Iqbal Wahhab who already owns the sucessful Cinnamon Club Indian restaurant in Westminster.

In Borough Market not only is the food different but so will the customers be according to Mr Wahhab who expects to see market traders dropping in for a Sillfield smoked bacon butty at breakfast and families coming for Sunday lunch.

The restaurant buys meat from Ginger Pig which is directly under the restaurant and the fish from Furness which trades from a pitch opposite Roast's lift. Sillfield Farm is supplying the smoked breakfast bacon and Turnips delivering the first vegetables.

Beer is from Utobeer and although Iqbal Wahhab is serving a couple of English wines he insists that only good wines will make it.

The high level restaurant, which is smoke free zone, has a high ceiling and semi open kitchen. The view to the north is of St Paul's Cathedral and to the south the diner looks down into the main market alongside Stoney Street.

In Stoney Street there is now Brew Wharf, a new microbrewery opened by the adjoining Vinopolis. The yard and open fronted bar area have proved popular during last month's warm weather.

Nearby at Bank End, and opposite the Anchor pub, Nando's and Wagamama have both opened in the railway arches. During the first few days business was slow but this may change.
