Accessible architecture

Southwark is to be one of the focal points of this year's London Architecture Biennale, which runs from Saturday 17 to Sunday 25 June. Coinciding with Architecture Week, there are more than 30 talks, walks, cycle rides and exhibitions in SE1 alone. Turn to the back page for an at-a-glance guide.

History will be made and re-enacted on Saturday 17 June when sixty of Farmer Sharp's Herdwick sheep cross the Millennium Bridge en route between the markets of Borough and Smithfield to launch the Biennale.

The Bishop of Southwark will give a send-off to the flock from their resting place in Southwark Cathedral's churchyard. Making use of the droving rights of Freemen of the City of London, Farmer Sharp, five sheep dogs, two mounted police and several shepherds will accompany the Herdwicks through Borough Market, along Clink Street, over the Millennium Bridge and up Peter's Hill. They will be penned in Smithfield where Bartholomew Fair will be recreated.

The Herdwick flock will be supplied by Farmer Sharp who will also provide mutton produce from his stall at Borough Market to feed visitors. Generations of the family have been involved in the mutton trade and particularly in Herdwicks from their base in Cumbria: his great uncle Thomas Storey was Beatrix Potter's shepherd and his grandfather sent sheep to Smithfield by train.

Other highlights include Shard of Glass architect Renzo Piano's 'sermon' in Southwark Cathedral, and a talk on the River Thames by Peter Ackroyd at Tate Modern.

A series of architecture cycle tours have been organised in association with Southwark Cyclists. The local cycling group has also been involved in staging an exhibition of designer solutions to the problem of bike theft which can been seen in Tooley Street during the Biennale.

Undercover Surrealism

Hayward Gallery; see listing on opposite page Tickets from www.inSE1.co.uk/hayward

This new exhibition aims to reflect the exploratory, experimental and diverse nature of the Surrealist movement.

Curator Dawn Ades complains that 'surreal' has become a synonym for 'odd' or 'bizarre', reducing the richness of the meaning of the term.

Undercover Surrealism draws its inspiration from the radical magazine DOCUMENTS, published in Paris in 1929 and 1930 by Georges Bataille. The exhibition draws together more than 200 objects that were reproduced in the pages of the magazine.

At the heart of the exhibition are key works by four Surrealist artists -Picasso, Miró, Masson and Dalí.

Of particular note is the way that the curators have approached the question of scale and the use of extreme close-up photography to create Surreal images of mundane objects stripped of their context.

DOCUMENTS was about much more than just visual art, embracing archaeology, music and literature. This diversity is reflected in the exhibition, with a 25-minute loop of extracts from films mentioned in the magazine, including Salvador Dali and Luis Buñuel's Un Chien Andalou.

A listening area offers some of the music that was part of the melting-pot of ideas to be found in DOCUMENTS, including work by Stravinsky, Duke Ellington and voodoo rhythms from Haiti.

A reading room at the end of the exhibition allows visitors to peruse the pages of DOCUMENTS, alongside English translations of key articles.

The exhibition occupies the lower level of the Hayward, leaving the upstairs space available for a programme of talks, debates, music and performance. Highlights include two special concert performances on Saturday 29 July of Stravinsky's The Soldier's Tale narrated by world-renowned bass-baritone Sir Willard White and performed by the London Sinfonietta and conducted by Diego Masson.

BOOK REVIEW

Shakespeare's Way

Shakespeare's Way is a new 146 mile waymarked route between Stratfordupon-Avon and Bankside. It follows a route which William Shakespeare may have taken between home town and the capital.



Oxford is the key midway point as this is where he stayed at the Crown Inn which was owned by his friend John Davenport. It also crosses the edge of the Cotswolds which is described in Richard II as "these high wild hills and rough uneven ways".

There are other literary associations for today's walkers who pass Sanford Church which has an annual Alice in Wonderland Sermon recalling its author who preached there, Woodstock known to Winston Churchill, Stonor where a secret printing press produced books in penal times and Marlow where Shelley found inspiration on the river whilst his wife Mary finished her novel.

The Way's creator and the guide's author is Peter Titchmarsh although his name does not appear in the book which is being sold in aid of the Shakespeare Hospice in Stratford. On inaugurating the Way, he was warmly greeted at the Globe by Dominic Dromgoole who has also written about his own walk from Stratford. But sadly Peter's book is not in the Globe's shop.
