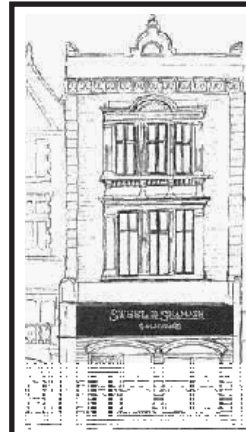

The Cuming Museum and the Southwark Local History Library this month present a programme of events to coincide with the 202nd birthday of Charles Dickens.

The lineup includes children's activities (page 3), two evening talks (page 4) and a guided walk (page 5).

"Charles Dickens will always be remembered as one of Britain's greatest and most iconic authors," said Cllr Veronica Ward, cabinet member for culture, leisure, sport and volunteering.

Dragon Cafe returns



A weekly open creative space for all – with an emphasis on those going through mental illness and recovery – will return for a second year from Monday 17 February.

Founded by the Mental Fight Club, the Dragon Cafe first ran for 12 months from October 2012 with support from the Maudsley Charity and the Big Lottery Fund.

Now the Monday programme will resume for another year in the crypt of St George the Martyr Church with the backing of Guy's and St Thomas' Charity.

Open every Monday from 12 noon to 8.30pm, The Dragon Cafe provides a safe, stimulating and creative space for more than 200 people each week.

The programme includes art exhibitions, freshly prepared and reasonably priced vegetarian food, a chill-out zone and more. Daytime groups include writing, art, tai chi, boxing, mindfulness, gardening, dancing and singing. Evening events range from performances, creative talks and discussions, to dancing and games nights.

Save the Rose 25 years on

This year is the 25th anniversary of the discovery of the remains of the Rose Theatre on Bankside.

The prospect of losing the archaeological remains of Bankside's first Elizabethan playhouse under a new office block sparked a campaign backed by leading figures from the arts world.

Local resident Richard Miller made a video recording of the all-night 'Save the Rose' rally held as the archaeological dig came to an end and the builders prepared to move in.

A newly edited version of his film will be shown this month at the Rose Playhouse site (see page 4) with an introduction by Richard Miller.

The Rose Theatre Trust has ambitious plans to complete the excavation of the part of the site not examined in 1989 and to create a permanent exhibition and performance space.
