THE GOLDEN JUBILEE

SOUTHWARK JUBILATION

SE1's community Jubilee party is the Southwark Jubilation on Sunday 2 June in Borough Market.

Following the cathedral's main morning service there will be a pig roast in the adjoining market. An invitation has gone out to local performers to contribute to this special occasion.

Already taking part are bands, trumpeters, pipers, morris dancers, jugglers, human statues and Pearly Kings and Queens. There will also be Punch and Judy shows, poetry reading, fancy dress and dancing.

The main Cathedral Eucharists are at 11am, just before the party, and 6.30pm. A Songs of Praise service with Coronation music, celebrity readers and hymn requests is to be broadcast in the churchyard at 3pm.

The next day the focus moves to the Pool of London for gun salutes. On Bank Holiday Tuesday there is the State coach procession to St Paul's Cathedral. The severe traffic restrictions should result in a low pollution level in SE1.

THE QUEEN AND SE1

The Queen has visited Southwark several times and is known to consider the cathedral to be 'beautiful'. Her Majesty distributed the Royal Maundy at the cathedral early in her reign and began Millennium evening by lighting the Southwark Millennium Candle in the cathedral before setting out from Bankside for the Dome. Dean Colin Slee has suggested to the Queen that she should drop in again to see the new building and courtyard opened since Millennium Night. Prince Philip was at the cathedral earlier this year.

MUSIC AT THE GLOBE

At Shakespeare's Globe on Bank Holiday Monday Peter Phillips is directing the Tallis Scholars in music from the Coronation of Elizabeth I. See Music.

LAMBETH PALACE

The Queen and Prince Philip will visit SE1 in the late afternoon on Thursday 6 June for a garden party at Lambeth Palace.

MBE FOR SE1'S JUBILEE MAN

John Hearn, Coin Street resident and a founder of the Colombo Street Centre, has received the MBE. He was invested at Buckingham Palace by Prince Charles following his inclusion in the last Honours List. John, who was living in SE1 during the Silver Jubilee, successfully campaigned for the new playground in Jubilee Gardens.



GUN SALUTE AT THE TOWER

The 49th anniversary of the Queen's Coronation will be marked on Bank Holiday Monday 3 June with a 62 gun salute at the Pool of London. The Honourable Artillery Company will fire from Tower Wharf at 1pm. Royal Salutes will also be fired at the same time on Monday 10 June for Prince Philip's Birthday and on Saturday 15 June for the Queen's Official Birthday. The viewing points are Tower Bridge and Potters Fields.

MASS OF THANKSGIVING

The 11.30am Sung Mass at St George's Cathedral on Sunday 2 June will be a Mass of Thanksgiving for Her Majesty's Golden Jubilee of Accession. The celebrant will be the Roman Catholic Archbishop of Southwark.

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Sydney opera chief to revamp South Bank

SYDNEY OPERA HOUSE CHIEF, Executive Michael Lynch is to be head of the South Bank centre from September.

"I am thrilled to have been appointed to lead the SBC" says the new chief executive. "This is potentially the world's greatest arts centre."

Having masterminded a

£20m refurbishment in Sydney, Michael Lynch becomes the latest in a long list of high profile arts administrators to attempt a renewal of the South Bank facilities. His salary will be less than his German predecessor whose plans hit funding difficulties.

Bendy buses for Waterloo route

MERCEDES BENDY buses will be operating on the 507 Waterloo-Victoria route from Wednesday 5 June -the first working day after the Jubilee Holiday weekend.

Each 18 metre long articulated bus can carry 150 people who will enter any of three doors. The new service will be cashless to avoid unnecessary delays and during day at least 28 of the 31 new buses will be in service. Security measures include CCTV.

First Hungerford footbridge now open

THE FIRST of the two new footbridges alongside Hungerford Bridge has quietly opened to the public.

Mayor of London Ken Livingstone, who attended a reception to mark the completion of the upstream crossing, said: "This is a crucial crossing for London - that's why I decided to step in and help make it happen when the project was threatened two years ago. Improving access to London on foot is a priority. This crossing meets that need and gives Londoners another beautifully-designed bridge to add to a world-renowned collection."

The northern end steps are in Northumberland Avenue.

A History of the Jubilee Walkway

THE LONDON Silver Jubilee Walkway was launched 25 years ago to mark the Silver Jubilee.

Most of the signed route was along the river's south bank and the new waymarking highlighted how much of the river was inaccessible.

Walking east it was possible to stay by the water only as far as the new National Theatre frontage. Then the way was along Upper Ground passing under a link between two cold stores. Bargehouse Alley at the side of Oxo Wharf led to a heliport. The walker had to cross Blackfriars Road and go down steps on the site of the Express building to pass under railway arches.

The river was regained beyond Falcon Point. After London Bridge signs took the route along Tooley Street bypassing Hay's Wharf until Morgan Lane where there was the Pickle Herring ecological garden. Now the river route coincides with the Thames Path opened in 1996. A new Jubilee Walkway map-guide will be published shortly.



Discovering London for Families

THE RIVERSIDE of SE1 is constantly changing but the information in Peter Matthews' *Discovering London for Families* (Shire £9.99) is as up to date as can be possible. (Unfortunately the Tea and Coffee Museum has just moved west.) The author, who has strong SE1 connections with a base at the 'Blue Badge' guides' headquarters in Borough High Street, devotes six chapters to the South Bank, Bankside and the Pool of London. Indeed the cover picture is the Palace of Westminster seen from the South Bank. There are plenty of illustrations including a view of the South Bank from the London Eye. The descriptions of the City are equally interesting. Most of the attractions which will keep children absorbed are within walking distance of SE1 or, as with Greenwich, at least a boat ride away from Bankside.

**Vincent in Brixton
at the National**

IN VINCENT in Brixton all is not as it seems at 87 Hackford Road. Enter Vincent van Gogh, a young art dealer seeking new lodgings. Within five minutes of trying to impress his landlady (played by Clare Higgins), to accept him as a tenant, Vincent reveals his blunt and tactless manner and at the same time declares his love for her daughter. Nicholas Wright's new play charting the plausible developments and early influences of Vincent van Gogh's life in London is a charming, strong and evocative drama entwined with profound sadness and humour. Superb casting of Jochum Ten Haaf as Vincent and impressive set design reminiscent of one of the familiar van Gogh paintings.

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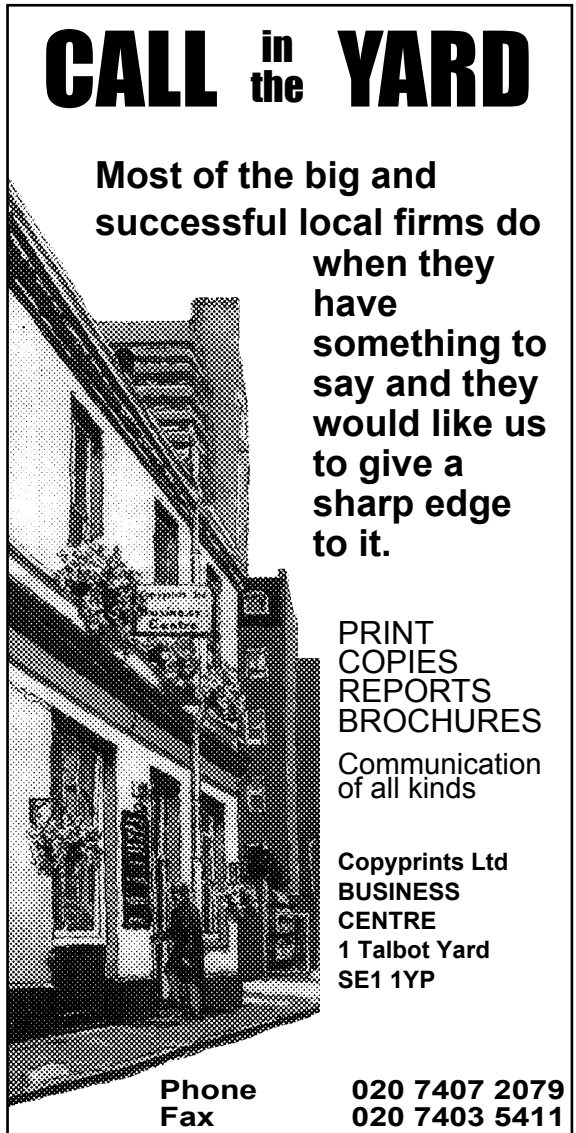

Gio Ponti at the Design Museum

PERHAPS THE Italians are uniquely undaunted by ambition but Gio Ponti's prolific output over six decades encompassed every facet of art, interiors and architecture and was a major force in establishing Italy at the forefront of 20th-century industrial design. Essentially an architect, he also promoted others: his own highly influential journals 'Domus' and 'Stele' were a window on to the world's latest, most vibrant visual ideas and bore witness to his own incessant growth and reinvention. Whatever the building material it was the art which made it durable and timeless, leading Ponti to declare that "the past does not exist because I consider everything in our culture to be simultaneous".
