Rose Theatre revived

Members of the *Shakespeare in Love* cast are expected on Bankside this month for opening of a permanent Rose Theatre exhibition.

The action of the hugely successful Oscar-winning film is set in the Rose which opened in 1587 and predates the original Globe built on the opposite side of Park Street twelve years later.

The theatre's remains were discovered in 1989 by archaeologists carrying out a routine excavation on the site of a proposed office block. The dig soon became the focus for a star-studded international campaign to Save the Rose. Eventually the developers agreed to redesign the new building to include basement display space for the remains.

Dr Clare Graham of the Rose Theatre Trust says: "This exhibition is intended to reawaken

public interest in the Rose and to help raise the funds needed for long term plans for its re-excavation and permanent display." Tickets will cost £3 (conc £2.50).



The exhibition centres around a light and sound presentation narrated by Sir Ian McKellen who has been a loyal supporter of the Rose preservation plans. The new technology show is the work of theatre designer William Dudley who says that he finds the exhibition space itself a strong source of inspiration. "It has a haunting

atmosphere at once primitive and timeless" he claims. "The pool of water which protects the theatre's remains is especially magical."

Culture Secretary Chris Smith officially opens the exhibition on Tuesday 13 April and from Wednesday the public will be admitted 362 days a year.

Riverside SE1 on Time Trail

A Tower to Tower time trail linking the Jewel Tower at Westminster to the Tower of London runs along the Thames south bank from County Hall to Hay's Galleria.

The two mile route, devised by English Heritage, is described as "a photographer's dream". Highlighted in SE1 are County Hall, the South Bank Centre, the Oxo Tower, Bankside Power Station and Southwark

Cathedral. Theatres featured include both the living Globe and the Rose site. The history of the Golden Hinde and HMS Belfast provide a dramatic contrast between the centuries.

NT 2000 & the Sixties

Last year playwrights, actors, directors, journalists and other theatre professionals were asked to nominate ten English language, 20th-century plays that they considered 'significant'. Now the year long NT2000 series of Platforms is charting and celebrating the progress of drama through the century as represented by one hundred plays. The list is based on the results of the poll and a playwright is only included once with the most voted for play. The result is a broad and diverse list. The Platforms—about a dozen a month—vary in content, may include an extract from the work and sometimes involve the appearance of authors and original cast members.

Desmond Tutu visits SE1

Archbishop Desmond Tutu will be at Southwark Cathedral this month to launch the cathedral's millennium appeal.

After years of being London's 'unknown cathedral', Southwark Cathedral is responding to the increase in visitor numbers and preparing to be able to respond to international promotion as part of the Millennium Mile.

Desmond Tutu is returning, as a former priest of the Southwark Diocese, on Friday 23 April for the Millennium launch. The appeal is to raise funds for the new buildings on the north side, disabled access, social care, musical work and vital restoration of the fabric. The cathedral site has been

a centre of Christian worship since the days of St Swithun in the 9th century. Eventually the cathedral will again become a 'waterside' church when an inlet on the Thames is created opposite the north transept.

The appeal launch will be followed by Choral Evensong at 5.30pm.


Dome was here first!

Book Review

Fruit but no garlic

According to Warren Mitchell the latest book by James Page-Roberts, *Cooking in Docklands*, is "a fascinating and even occasionally horrifying glimpse of the Good Old Days". The author is both a wine and food expert as well as an authority on Docklands history so this book is packed with reminiscences about the days before washing up liquid when soda crystals made the plates and glasses shine. Breakfast before school has always been a problem but 80 years ago the baker sold hot bread pudding to passing schoolchildren. No garlic and not many mushrooms but plenty of fruit in season in the Good Old Days.
