# Young Vic returns home to The Cut

**The Young Vic's £12.4 million new building is nearly completed and due to open this month with the community opera *Tobias and the Angel*.**

The nationally acclaimed production by Jonathan Dove and David Lan was staged at the nearby church of St John's Waterloo just after the Young Vic building had been handed over to the builders two years ago. Now the 80-minute performance celebrates the Young Vic's return home and again singers of all ages will be drawn from SE1.

The opening night is Wednesday 11 October with the show running for two weeks. *Love and Money*, a new play by Dennis Kelly, will be staged next month in the smaller Maria theatre.

The Young Vic Company has been in exile in

Kennington for the past two years. Productions have been staged at venues across London and beyond.

Artistic director David Lan describes the original Young Vic, which dated from 1970, as a "dirt-cheap improvisation tacked on to the wreck of an old butcher's shop". Never intended to remain on The Cut for more than a few years, by the turn of the century the theatre building was in a precarious state.

The new building, which incorporates the frontage of the old Wilson Bros butcher's shop at number 66 The Cut, has been designed by Haworth Tompkins. The practice has undertaken a number of other local projects including Coin Street's new neighbourhood centre on Stamford Street and new housing in Harper Road as part of the Elephant and Castle regeneration programme.

## Reflections on 100 issues

**This is the 100th issue of *in SE1* which first appeared in May 1998.**

We knew then that huge change was imminent with Bankside Power Station due to become Tate Modern in Millennium Year. A growing number of other planning applications pointed to a dramatic change in the cityscape.

Eight years later those forecasts have proved correct with Kate Hoey MP only last month declaring that SE1 had become the centre of London. Research last year showed that more than 7 in 10 visitors to London now come to the South Bank and Bankside, a higher figure than Leicester Square or Covent Garden. The focus of the capital's artistic and cultural life has moved across the river.

In our first issue we promised to highlight the many advantages of working and living in SE1 and with your support we shall continue to do so. Meanwhile we know that transformation has brought both welcome improvements and new problems such as the lack of affordable housing.

## Food &amp; drink news in brief

## RSJ reopens

RSJ, a South Bank fixture for more than a quarter of a century, has reopened after a kitchen fire last month.

## Conran buy-out

Conran Holdings last month sold a 49% stake in its restaurant business to a management team and its financiers. Sir Terence Conran said that his company would remain "very much connected" with the restaurant firm. Conran Restaurants also plans to launch a major new restaurant in the refurbished Royal Festival Hall when it reopens next year.

## Joe's Kitchen

This new restaurant opened during the summer in Marshalsea Road close to Borough tube station. Owned by The Restaurant Group plc (the company behind the Garfunkel's and Chiquito chains) which has its head office in the same building, it serves all-day breakfasts, pancakes, burgers, pizza and salads.

## Afternoon tea at Roast

Afternoon tea is the latest venture at the Borough Market restaurant which opened a year ago this month. From 9 October tea will be served Monday to Saturday 3pm-5pm. The price is £15 per person (for champagne add £9). Sandwiches include Egg Mayonnaise and Mustard Cress, Inverawe Smoked Loch Etive Trout, Cucumber, Coronation Chicken and Celery and Cream Cheese. Scones with Strawberry Jam and Devonshire Clotted Cream, Chocolate Fudge Cake, Rich Fruit Cake and Mini Fruit Tartlets complete the feast.

## Roast marks market's 250th

To celebrate the 250th anniversary of Borough Market Roast will be offering a menu of 18th-century dishes from 19 to 31 October. Starters include Chicken Soup with Vermicelli, Salt Cod in Cream Sauce and Sweet Potato Rissolos. Main courses will feature Stewed Eels with Bacon, Braised Haunch of Venison, Mackerel stuffed with Fennel and Mint and grilled with Anchovy Butter.

## Award for Architects' Table

The Table, the Southwark Street eatery run by architects Allies and Morrison, has won the Best Cheap Eats category of the Time Out Eating and Drinking awards. The awards ceremony was held last month at Roast in Borough Market. Paul Appleton, partner at Allies &amp; Morrison, told the London SE1 website: "We were just delighted. It means a lot to us that people like our food and like to eat it in our place. We put our heart and soul into The Table and it is lovely that other people value it too."

## Blue plaque for Manze's

Manze's pie and mash shop in Tower Bridge Road has been awarded a Southwark blue plaque in recognition of its 104-year history. The Peckham branch was recognised last year.

## EXHIBITION REVIEW

**Henry Moore: War & Utility**

At the Imperial War Museum until Wednesday 26 April

**This exhibition was originally conceived for the Henry Moore Foundation at Perry Green in Hertfordshire but the Imperial War Museum is a fitting setting for a show which hinges on the artist's experiences during the London Blitz.**

The show also touches on Moore's involvement in the response of British artists to the Spanish Civil War.

The Second World War was the only period in Moore's career when he wasn't sculpting so he turned to drawing, and it is these works that form the basis of this exhibition.

The poignant Shelterers series is a reminder of the sanctuary provided by the London Underground when London was under aerial bombardment. And a glance through the window into the IWM atrium reveals contemporary aircraft.

As Moore himself wrote: "I was fascinated by the sight of people camping out deep under the ground. I had never seen so many rows of reclining figures and even the holes out of which the trains were coming seemed to me to be like the holes in my sculpture ... They were a bit like

the chorus in a Greek drama telling us about the violence we don't actually witness".

A darkened room houses some of Moore's coalmining pictures depicting skeletal figures toiling deep under ground.

The final room - Austerity and Liberation - looks at the artist's post-war work, including a textile prints from a series designed to help revive the fashion industry after the austerity of the war years.

Of local interest is Moore's working model for the sculpture - entitled *Reclining Figure: Festival* - he created for the Festival of Britain on the South Bank.

This is a relatively small exhibition and whilst Moore has many fans who will no doubt be eager to visit the £7 admission charge seems a little steep.

**A Moon for the Misbegotten**

**This play lasts just over three hours including the interval. But you should arrive in good time to enjoy the fabulous set by Paul Atkinson and Alistair Turner. It is wonderfully convincing and the lighting by the Old Vic's Stuart Crane and Alex Fox gradually creates the feel of the growing heat of the American plain.**

Towards the end of the 24 hour story there is a glorious dawn. Even after three hours you will want to stay for the curtain call which has already brought much of an audience to its feet.

There is a cast of five with the three stars giving powerful performances. The first half is just an hour long with Eugene O'Neill's play really moving ahead after the interval. Funny lines are few at the beginning with Josie Hogan (Eve Best) and Phil Hogan (Colm Meaney) setting the scene in their Irish accents.

Eventually Jim Tyrone (Kevin Spacey) appears on the long dusty path from the inn, deliberately swinging a water can like a thurible, to give one of his best performances since arriving at the Old Vic.

Eve Best, often using her face, slips easily and quickly from downtrodden land girl to feisty daughter and then young love.

Colm Meaney, as a lazy half drunk farmer, gives an energetic believable performance in a vital role.

This will be another landmark of the Spacey era.
