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National Film Theatre becomes BFI Southbank this month

The long-awaited expansion of the National Film Theatre - under the new name BFI Southbank - will open on 14 March, the British Film Institute has confirmed.





When the revamp was first announced it was hoped that it would be finshed in time for last year's London Film Festival. Then in October BFI bosses named 1 February as the big day. Now the date is set for Wednesday 14 March.

BFI Southbank makes use of the space under Waterloo Bridge that has lain empty since the Museum of the Moving Image closed in 1999.

A new entrance to BFI Southbank has been created on Theatre Avenue, the boulevard linking Upper Ground and the river between the National Theatre and Waterloo Bridge.

In addition to the existing three cinemas the complex will include the Mediatheque, offering free on-demand access to over 300 film and television titles from the BFI National Archive.

The new BFI Gallery will showcase artists' work with moving image, opening with an exhibition from the New York-based pioneers of media art Jennifer & Kevin McCoy entitled Tiny, Funny, Big and Sad.

A studio cinema provides an intimate space where visitors can discover something unexpected ranging from archive and contemporary film, video and television, talks and presentations plus community and education events.

A new Benugo restaurant and bar will complement the existing riverside Film Cafe.

For several years the NFT has lacked a shop; now the Filmstore will offer more than 2,000 book titles and 1,000 DVDs.

The £4.5 million overhaul has been described a "stepping-stone" to the BFI's long-term plan for a major new Film Centre in London. The Hungerford Bridge Car Park and a site near Tate Modern have previously been touted as potential locations.

The BFI has followed the example of the neighbouring South Bank arts centre in adopting the single-word Southbank style for its brand.

Comedy fest

Four promoters who stage comedy nights in local pubs have teamed to launch SE1 Laughter Week - seven days of comedy for locals, workers and tourists.

Last November four comedy promoters - Paul Ricketts amd Verity Welch (Up The Arts Comedy at The Miller of Mansfield & Horse Bar), Alexis Dubus (Falling Down With Laughter at Belushi's), Gary Colman (Electric Mouse at The Leather



Exchange) and Elise Harris (Ship of Fools at The Ship) - got together to discuss staging a comedy festival.

Now SE1 Laughter Week is set to become a reality, kicking off on Friday 16 March with a free open-air event at The Scoop.

As local residents Paul Ricketts, Alexis Dubus and Elise Harris say that the area is ideally suited to a comedy festival designed to reach all sections of the population.



Calder Bookshop and theatre under threat



The Godot Company will be performing this month at the Bookshop Theatre which is facing closure.

The tiny theatre is at the back of the Calder Bookshop in The Cut which is facing closure due to a financial crisis and a rent increase.

Publisher and author John Calder called the theatre, which opened last year, the "Baby Vic". Tim Waterstone was guest of honour at the opening of the bookshop in 2001.

Unless a buyer is found willing to stay in The Cut then John Calder expects the small theatre also used for Thursday evening readings to have to close and the Godot Company would lose its base.

The shop remains open this month thanks to the help of friends and actors. The building also houses Calder Publications, started almost sixty years ago. It has more Nobel prize winners on its list than any other UK publisher.

Southwark resident Barbara Robson, who has attended many of Calder's Thursday evening readings and talks, described the bookshop as an asset to the area said the closure was a great loss. She praised John Calder's great enthusiasm and courage in coming to SE1 in the first place.

"I am very sorry" said Marek Siemaszko of Tlon Books at the Elephant & Castle. "If this is the process of regeneration then the results are going to be dire."

Hollar exhibition at Guildhall Library

London Before and After the Great Fire: Etchings by Wenceslaus Hollar 1607-1677 • Guildhall Library Print Room in the City of London Mon-Sat; 9.30am-5pm; until Saturday 12 May.

Wenceslaus Hollar, who commemorated in Southwark cathedral and drew his panoramas from the tower, was born 400 years ago.

The anniversary is being marked by an exhibition at the City of London's Guildhall Library which is a short distance from where he worked.

This is a small exhibition of just forty etchings but it is a chance to enjoy his Long View which shows Bankside and Hay's Wharf as well as the City just at the end of Charles I's reign.

Hollar shows Winchester House still complete along with its kitchen garden on the Vinopolis site. St Mary Overy Dock can just be seen between buildings as you look down from the top of the cathedral - or St Saviour's as the old priory had been rebranded.

Also dated 1647 is a view of the future cathedral from the north. The artist has his back to river as he sketches his usuual vantage point from the waterfront.

Equally fascinating is the 'Panorama of Westminster from Lambeth' which shows the view from the top of the Novotel's predecessor in Lambeth Road. St Mary's and the Palace are in the foreground with the future Archbishop's Park well stocked with trees. Beyond is the flat open space of Lambeth Marsh stretching towards the riverside parkland at

Also worth studying are Hollar's views from Southwark's church tower of the City before and after the Great Fire. One can imagine the Borough's traders and inn keepers looking across the water at the destruction which had brought them extra trade.

HISTORY

Slave trade bicentenary

The bicentenary of the abolition of slavery is being marked this month.

The walk of witness from Westminster to Kennington on Saturday 24 March will pass along Lambeth Road with the Archbishop of Canterbury. Its crossing at Lambeth Bridge in silence will represent the slaves crossing the Atlantic.

The following day's Choral Evensong at Southwark Cathedral will include the premiere of an anthem marking the anniversary. The preacher is Canon David Isherwood, vicar of Holy Trinity Clapham Common where anti-slavery campaigner William Wilberforce worshipped.

Earlier in the week a Thomas Hodgkin Symposium at Guy's Hospital will look at the life of Thomas Hodgkin (1799-1866) who discovered Hodgkin's Disease and also campaigned against slavery, and the evening will conclude with a talk by the Revd James Buxton, King's College Chaplain at Guy's, on the struggle against contemporary forms of slavery.

A floor at the Elspeth Kyle Gallery in Blackfriars Road is being given over to a show, Hawkins & Co, featuring a group of contemporary artists considering the legacy of Sir John Hawkins, In 1562 he became the first Englishman to participate in the mass kidnapping of people from Africa and transporting them to forced labour camps of the Caribbean.

At the.gallery@oxo photojournalist Pete Pattisson presents a selection of photographs tracing his personal journey through the contemporary forms of enslavement that are still in existence in India, Burma, Ghana and Haiti. In India alone there are estimated to be as many as 22 million slaves, more than the combined figure for the rest of the world.

The Soldiers' Fortune at the Young Vic

Oliver Ford Davies and David Bamber are the stars of David Lan's revival of *The Soldiers' Fortune*.

This is the third major production at the re-opened Young Vic and it has surprises in the form of the set.

On entering the familiar round you are confronted by a traditional proscenium arch, like a giant Pollock's Theatre complete with a sham Royal Arms. The designer is Lizzie Clachan, a founder member of Shunt, who has really devised a clever layout with the traditional curtains as the backdrop.

But it is a reminder that the play is a Restoration comedy written in 1681 although the production often has a late 18th-century feel hinting at Sir Francis Dashwood and his Hell Fire Club.

But the Hell Fire was upstream on the Thames whilst *The Soldiers' Fortune* is a London play. The action takes place in Covent Garden with references to the familiar steeple of St Mary-le-Bow and a warning from Sir Davy Dunce to avoid the ghastly suburb of Knightsbridge. The programme has a fascinating map.

Oliver Ford Davies, a lover of the Old Vic's heritage, has come to the Young Vic to give a brilliant performance as a muddled Sir Davy. Also perfectly cast is David Bamber as an outrageous Sir Jolly Jumble who is obsessed with sex, "boobies" and arranging liasons but never weddings.

The story revolves around two soldiers back from war and penniless just like the play's author Thomas Otway. Captain Beaugard is played by Ray Feardon who has recently been seen in *Coronation Street* and *Prime Suspect*. Fellow soldier Courtine is played by Alec Newman whose television includes Spooks.

Their women are portrayed by Anne-Marie Duff as the warm Lady Dunce and Kananu Kirimi as the very cool Sylvia.

One or two actors suddenly but briefly burst into song. This just works. More successful is having the musicians on stage as part of the action.

Lizzie Clachan's complicated set has another surprise: a sauna in the pit.

Lilian Baylis: A Biography

Elizabeth Shafer's book on Lilian Baylis has been praised by Oliver Ford Davies who said that he was unable to put it down.

Although the author Elizabeth Shafer is an academic her biography is easy to read and the early chapters on Baylis's life are just as fascinating as those on the years when she ran the Old Vic.


Lilian Baylis is the link between her aunt Emma Cons and the post war Old

Vic. Lilian knew Octavia Hill, she met Mark Twain and she was a very close friend of Ethel Everest whose father gave his name to the highest mountain. The author shows that Baylis was ahead of her time in being a woman in charge and able to mix with all classes.

She was helped by what many believed was her slight cockney accent but which was really a South African accent. This had been picked up during a long stay abroad and she remained a keen traveller when not struggling to keep the Old Vic in funds. She had learned about crisis theatre management when touring in South Africa with her performing parents.

She had a strong Christian faith which the author suggests enabled her to pace herself and survive in a crisis. Lilian, like Sybil Thorndike and Ben Greet (who lived in Lambeth Road), thought that religion and theatre went together. She loved funerals.

Lilian Baylis was convinced that theatre must always include social work and involve the community. Today Kevin Spacey seems to be following Baylis policy by appearing at a local at residents' meetings and bringing neighbours into the theatre as well as the rich and famous.
