RFH reborn

The Royal Festival Hall reopens this month with a weekend of free music. The Overture begins at dusk on Friday 8 June with massed choirs arriving by candlelit river barge at Festival Pier. The music, open-air dancing and spectacle continue across the Southbank Centre site until dusk on Sunday. Over the weekend 24,000 free tickets will be distributed for special performances in the concert hall.

After years of proposal and counter-proposal for the South Bank arts complex, a two-year closure and £115 million investment have transformed the Royal Festival Hall and its foyers. Southwark-based architects Allies and Morrison have stripped away 50 years of accumulated clutter to create bigger and better spaces for cultural events and education programmes. The Southbank Centre's offices now sit in a new building between the RFH and the railway.

The foyers – opened up as an all-day drop-in venue by the GLC in 1983 – are certain to regain their status as a favourite London meeting place.

The acoustics of the concert hall have been transformed to the benefit of performers and audiences alike.

The Festival Hall building hosts three new

food and drink establishments. The former People's Palace restaurant is now home to Skylon run by D&D London (formerly Conran Restaurants). At ground level the old Festival Square cafe is a branch of Spitalfields-based British restaurant Canteen. And the Riverside Terrace Cafe replaces the old foyer branch of EAT.

More change is on the way: Southbank Centre chair Lord Hollick has confirmed that his organisation is working with the British Film Institute to bring forward plans for a new film centre on the Hungerford Car Park site. And more immediately there is the prospect of yet more bars and restaurants in the spaces below the Queen Elizabeth Hall and Purcell Room.

BOOK REVIEW

Restaurant Graphics

Grant Gibson • Laurence King • £25

“Some of the most successful restaurant brands have used graphic design effectively to dominate shopping precincts and city centres around the globe” says journalist Grant Gibson.

Among thirty-seven restaurants around the world featured is Roast in Borough Market. Its interior uses natural materials including wood so designer Pierre Vernier of hgv followed suit with a grain theme for the stationery. The motif appearing in the cross-section of the wood is very slightly different each time although many diners probably do not notice. For example, the wine list grain has the suggestion of a bottle and the dessert menu contains a pear. The bill has an onion. Even the staff brochure has a motif – peas in a pod.

Jeremy Coysten of Bermondsey's North Project spent two weeks researching in China and Taiwan to get an unusual design for Yauatcha's cake boxes rather than use the traditional gold and red expected of a Chinese restaurant.

The author claims that EAT owes much of its success to the graphics by Pentagram's Angus Hyland. EAT abides at all times to strict guidelines for its logo-type across all products.

He also includes a brief mention of a project “that will never grace the pages of the style press” but still proves that graphic design matters. This is the Real Greek menu card which has increased turnover by 15 per cent after an old design which baffled diners was abandoned.

The 176 page large paperback has 250 pleasing colour illustrations.

Buy Harry Potter locally and support Waterloo school

In the theatre building alongside the Globe theatre there is now a long bar called the Swan at the Globe. This Theatre Bar has a fine long oak table with wooden stools. For a first floor view of the River Thames you can choose an intimate table for two.

Sadly the name does not refer to The Swan Theatre which stood nearby and was known to William Shakespeare before the first Globe was built. Catering at today's Globe is by The Swan of West Malling.

The menu is short but impressive. A ploughman's (£6.50) is a generous serving of cheddar and stilton with rolls. The mixed bean and seed salad (£5.50) is surprisingly filling. Puddings (£3) are a choice of fruit cake and ice cream or a large soft brownie.

The coffee choice includes Espresso, Americano and Cappuccino (around £2). Organic juices include Sicilian lemonade.

Service is quick without being fussy. So far the just opened Swan has not been too crowded although it's beginning to be popular at lunchtime with those attending the Globe matinées. The Swan at The Globe is a great improvement on the original catering. It might become popular. In addition there is a restaurant upstairs.
