

Lift-off for BA London Eye

ondon's skyline will be dramatically changed once the British Airways London Eye (formerly the Millennium Wheel) is lifted into a vertical position this month. The giant wheel has been constructed on a series of temporary platforms across the river alongside Jubilee Gardens, with each segment being lifted into place by the giant Taklift 2 crane from Rotterdam, last seen in central London for the demolition of the old **Blackfriars Railway** Bridge. The wheel will be operational in time for 31 December's riverside Millennium celebrations with the first passengers being carried in late January 2000. Facilities for passengers are under construction in the corner of County Hall and will include a coffee bar run by Costa Coffee.

The lifting operation will last at least 24 hours and is likely to take place during the week commencing Monday 16 August.

ungerford Bridge is to undergo a transformation with a walkway on both sides of the railway bridge.

The crossing dates from 1845 when when Isambard Kingdom Brunel designed a suspension footbridge to serve Hungerford Market at Charing Cross. Shortly afterwards the market became the site for the new Charing Cross Station and a new bridge was built replacing the suspension bridge which was taken to Bristol to become part of Clifton Suspension Bridge. The iron railway crossing included a foot crossing as part of the planning agreement although the railway company claimed that few crossed the old bridge due to the river's stench. One of the brick Brunel piers, known as the Surrey Pier, remains near the South Bank and this will be restored and opened up as a public passage for those wishing to move

from the upstream to the downstream footbridge (pictured above). The last time there was a footbridge on both sides was 1951 when a Baily Bridge was built on the upstream side to carry visitors to the Festival of Britain.

The Jubilee Walkway will be diverted on to long bridges to pass through the Surrey Pier. Work is due to begin in October with construction of the upstream footbridge completed in December 2000 and the downstream side rebuilt by April 2001.

Cinema Review

The Old Man and the Sea

This is a strange film. The first half is a live-action docu-drama about the life of Ernest Hemingway. Whilst the scenery is spectacular and the production makes good use of the capabilities of the IMAX format, *Hemingway: A* Portrait fails to do justice to the life and works of this literary legend. It is, however, cleverly designed to lead into the second section of the film, an animated adaptation of the writer's award-winning novella *The Old Man and the Sea*. This is a captivating story of an old Cuban fishérman and his struggle with a huge fish. Alexander Petrov worked for two years on the ground-breaking oil-on-glass animation, hand-painting 29,000 frames for this 22 minute film The minute film. The Canadian-produced film had its world première here in SE1 when Prince Charles opened the cinema in June. 



extravaganza will have a Russian flavour to tie in with the rest of the 1999 Festival bringing a feast of Russian culture and colour to SE1 this autumn with concerts, exhibitions and community events.

Soloists' Ensemble

)n Saturday 9 October Southwark Festival is presenting an amazing concert in Southwark Cathedral led by the Soloists' Ensemble, under the direction of Robert Turrell, who have all been working with 150 Southwark schoolchildren in the preparation of a world première entitled The Lost Puzzle of Gondwala. This is a multi-cultural journey around the world written by local children's author Malorie Blackman.

SE1 Sculpture

Culptures made by Southwark children from recycled materials are ready to go on display this month at Guy's Hospital and from the beginning of October along Hay's Wharf. The varied and colourful works are part of Southwark Festival's commitment to building bridges between the SE1 community and institutions and art professionals. Schools involved are Tower Bridge Junior School, Victory School, Alma Primary School and Guy's Hospital School.

Russian song in Shand Street

Alexander Izbitser will be singing and performing Alexander Vertinski songs in a specially created atmosphere at Innocence in Shand Street.

Vertinski first performed dressed as Pierrot in Moscow in 1917 in a small 300 seat theatre. In exile after the Revolution he appeared in evening dress and became known as the 'Russian Bard' with a wide repertoire of songs. The fifty songs to be performed by Izbitser include Someone Else's Cities, Above the Pink Ocean, The Farewell Supper and Magnolia Tango. Alexander Izbitser, who is considered to be one of the best singers of Vertinski songs, has agreed to come to Southwark from his new York home for this event. Russian Chamber Orchestra

The Russian Chamber Orchestra of London will be performing in Southwark Cathedral as part of Southwark Festival.

The evening concert, on Wednesday 13 October, will provide an opportunity to hear and enjoy the gifted musicians playing a programme to include works by Stravinsky, Shostakovich and Arensky. The new orchestra, established by Olga Balakleets and launched in

Balakleets and launched in SE1 last year, brings together young and talented Russian players based in London. Many are prize-winners in national and international competitions who combine busy solo and orchestral careers in Britain and around the world.

The orchestra has engagements in Europe and Russia following the Southwark concert. The Southwark Festival appearance is sponsored by Bacon & Woodrow.
