Augustine's Oak at the Globe

 Γ he Globe – which on 21 September commemorates the 400th anniversary of the first performance of Julius Caesar – recently celebrated the première of the first play to be written specifically for the reconstructed Globe. The play is Augustine's Oak, and the playwright is Peter playwright is Peter Oswald who has been the Globe's writer in residence for the past three seasons. It's a modern verse play telling the story of the mission of St Augustine to convert the pagan English. The plot is based on the Venerable Bede's Ecclesiastical Histories. The 1400th anniversary of Augustine's arrival on the Kent coast was widely commemorated in 1997, when a group of pilgrims recreating his journey passed through SE1, walking along the riverside from London Bridge City for tea at Lambeth Palace. • Augustine's Oak is in repertory at Shakespeare's Globe until Friday 24

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Book Review

History in SEI's pláques

There are 26 historic plaques in SE1. The count comes from Discovering London's *Plaques*, the first comprehensive work on the subject. The author, who wrote the book because he could not find what he wanted in the library, includes all plaques and not just the official Blue Plaques. There are even some unofficial blue plaques. Park Street has both its plaques included in the illustrations such are the importance of the brewery and Globe sites. One of London's oldest commemorative plaques is in Tooley Street (James Braidwood 1861) and how many people know that the first Bible in English was printed on the site of the Borough High Street Post Office? Or that the nearby Police Station is at the place once known as Stones End because here the stone paved road gave way at the toll gate to the rough country track leading to the Elephant & Castle junction?

 Γ here are two exhibitions for the price of one at the Hayward. Downstairs are the large heads of Chuck Close painted in some cases with fingers or created by layers of card. However, the subjects are not beautiful and so huge a head can be disturbing if viewed alone without a crowd. Upstairs there are even more amazing pictures. These are 'old' photographs taken 30 years ago on the moon. Many are familiar but some of the selection from 32,000 pictures in the NASA archive have been cloned, using digital scanning techniques, to show the moon landscape as never seen before. The exhibition book is £25 -a saving of £10 in the bookshops.

Whenever I walk past, this place is open – probably due to the proximity of the station. But it's good. Hams and pasta adorn the walls, and if over stocked the chiller cabinet gets any bigger it's going to need planning permission. Tables outside here too and it does catch the sun. Fantastic burgers here – and everything is served with a selection of salads... but don't be worried if yours isn't the same as your dining partners – it's all very random. Be aware of the panini sandwiches, my colleague described it as a 'tasteless flip flop'. But the hot food is good. Especially the mortadella sandwich. Apparently they are applying for a licence – so you could be sipping the vino at this Waterloo soon to be watering hole. Prices are reasonable. It's open late every day too.

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
