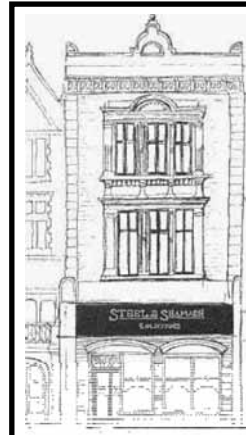

New markets start this month

Two new food markets and a night antiques market launch this month in SE1.

A new monthly food market launches on Sunday 1 September at Neo Bankside next to Tate Modern.

On Friday 13 September the Bermondsey Antique Market will begin a new programme of occasional night markets stretching through the afternoon and evening in an attempt to draw new customers to the historic Friday market.

The weekly London Bridge Farmers' Market – to be held on the King's College London campus at Guy's Hospital – launches on Tuesday 24 September (9am-2pm).

London Farmers' Markets insists that all products are raised, grown, produced, gathered, caught or baked within 100 miles of the M25. Traders will include Dr Adrian Izzard of Wild Country Organics. Martin Yorworth will sell fresh fish from the Thames Estuary.

Endless Stair at Tate Modern



An interactive installation inspired by MC Escher will appear outside Tate Modern this month as part of the London Design Festival.

The Endless Stair – designed by dRMM – will be located on Bankside from 13 September to 10 October.

The installation has a total of 187 steps. The shortest route to the top is 48 steps. The Endless Stair will be accessible during daylight hours. At night it will be illuminated with an artistic lighting scheme.

New look for Thames Festival

The Mayor's Thames Festival relaunches this month with a new 10-day format from 6 to 15 September.

The Thames Festival has been held annually each September since 1997 and has been concentrated on the south bank of the river between Westminster Bridge and Tower Bridge.

In 2013 – faced with a decline in sponsorship income – the Thames Festival Trust has announced a change in direction, with a more modest 10-day programme spanning a wider geographic area replacing the intense weekend of riverside activities. There will be no fireworks this year.

"By shedding the restriction of a weekend and broadening its geographical horizons, combined with a fantastic and wide-ranging programme of events, the festival will inspire people to re-connect with London's greatest natural asset in new and surprising ways," said festival director Adrian Evans.

River Thames by Potters Fields Park
7.45pm-8.30pm; free
The centrepiece of The Mayor's Thames Festival, this is a spectacular, specially composed performance for the Thames by Richard Wilson RA, twice nominated for the Turner Prize, and Cultureship directors and artists, Zatorski + Zatorski. Historic vessels are modified to become marvellous musical instruments and sculptural pieces in themselves, resurrecting the lost sounds of the river with steam whistles, bells, horns hooters, sirens and canon. The day-long performance starts at sea near the mouth of the Thames Estuary, when a lone ship makes its way upriver to join the other mustered vessels at Trinity Buoy Wharf, home of London's last lighthouse. The fleet will then go on to present a dazzling finale of sound, light and steam at Tower Bridge later that night. The vessels will bring back the historic sounds of the Thames as they perform a live, moving, operatic concerto against the stunning backdrop of one of the world's most famous bridges.
