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Owl comes home to roost

FLORENCE Nightingale's Greek pet owl Athena is to be given a new home at the Florence Nightingale Museum at St Thomas' Hospital.

Museum staff are delighted to have obtained the stuffed Little Owl (Athene Noctua) from Florence's family home of Lea Hurst in Derbyshire.

Athena is thought to have been born on 5 June 1850. She was rescued by Florence Nightingale from some Greek

boys at the Parthenon in Athens, where she had fallen from a nest. To be persuaded to enter a cage, she had to be mesmerised, but she became the devoted companion of her mistress, travelling everywhere in her pocket. Athena would sit on her mistress's finger to receive her one daily meal, and curtsy and bow on a table.

The owl will be part of an exhibition opening in November.

Bankside residents to petition House of Lords for Tate Tower appeal

BANKSIDE residents are to petition the House of Lords for permission to appeal against the planning go-ahead for the proposed 20-storey building alongside Tate Modern.

BROAD (Bankside Residents for Appropriate Development) lost its appeal in the High Court last month having argued that the whole planning procedure was so flawed that objectors did not get a fair hearing, and that planning permission

for the block should now be quashed.

They claimed that it would significantly affect residents at Bankside Lofts, opposite Tate Modern, and residents at Falcon Point which contains 110 low-rise flats north of the proposed tower block site.

The site, once a paper warehouse, was sold to developers London Town for £7.6 million in December 2000.

Mary Wollstonecraft plaque unveiled**AUTHOR** Claire Tomalin has visited the new Gambia Street Garden to unveil a blue plaque in honour of the early feminist writer Mary Wollstonecraft.Mary lived in Dolben Street from 1788 to 1791 just before her famous book *The Vindication of the Rights of Women* was published. She had chosen Southwark as her home to be near the publishers and bookshops which were in St Paul's Churchyard. Wollstonecraft walked across the new Blackfriars Bridge to the City.

Mary's house has

been replaced but the three frontages known as Thompson House, facing the garden, would have been familiar to her.

Claire Tomalin, Mary Wollstonecraft's biographer, also cut a ribbon to mark the opening of the garden.

Bus driver charged

A BUS driver has been charged with causing death by dangerous driving following the death of cyclist Vicki McCreery on Blackfriars Bridge last May.

The 37-year-old victim was a senior physiotherapist at St Thomas' Hospital. She was on her way home to the City at about 5.30pm when she was involved in the accident. The bridge was closed in both directions for several hours and there has been huge concern expressed about cyclists' safety on the bridge.

Since the death of Vicki McCreery on Monday 10 May the bus lane has been removed and the cycle lane changed. The bridge carries 54,000 vehicles every weekday.

Bus driver Michael Duncan is due to appear at Southwark Crown Court in September.

Second postal delivery scrapped

HOUSEHOLDS in SE1 are receiving letters from Royal Mail confirming that the second delivery is being abolished.

Sales and customer services director Mark Thomson, writing from a Barnsley address, claims that the current two deliveries a day service is "inefficient and

costly". He also suggests that the public in SE1 will need to have patience while post staff get used to new rounds.

Meanwhile Royal Mail is introducing "a new free service" called Mail Collect which will allow "customers" to fetch their own mail from the sorting office after 8.30am.

Late night viewing for Edward Hopper

THE Edward Hopper exhibition at Tate Modern is staying open until 10pm every night from Friday 20 August until Sunday 5 September. The extended opening hours are in response to the huge success of the show which looks set to be one of the most popular ever at Tate. Edward Hopper has already been seen by over 200,000

people, with daily visits in excess of 3,000.

Edward Hopper (1882-1967), sponsored by American Airlines, is the first exhibition of his work in the UK for over twenty years. He is considered the pre-eminent painter of modern America and many of his works have become iconic images of the twentieth century.

Mary I came to Southwark for honeymoon

THE Countess of Wessex, Southwark Cathedral Friends patron, was present at the opening of an exhibition at Winchester Cathedral marking the 450th anniversary of the marriage of Mary I and Philip of Spain.

Many of the exhibits come from SE1 having been loaned by Lambeth Palace. A service

was held on the actual anniversary of the wedding at Winchester on St James's Day 25 July 1554.

Afterwards the Royal couple arrived by water in Southwark from Richmond on 17 August. Overnight honeymoon accommodation was provided at Brandon Place mansion on the

Sainsbury's site in Borough High Street and the Bishop of Winchester, having travelled ahead, offered refreshment at his palace in Clink Street.

On the following day, after riding around the bishop's park, Mary took her new husband over London Bridge for a City welcome.

book review

Walking Dickensian London

RICHARD Jones' guide contains 25 walks. Most take the reader through certain sites in Victorian London associated with Dickens and his novels and two are in Cobham and Rochester; places associated with the earlier and later part of his life. The walks range from two to seven miles and the author conveniently specifies the best time of day to take them.

The Southwark walk starts at Monument Station and winds its way south, with a suggested stop at the George Inn, to Borough Station. Sites include the remains of the Marshalsea Prison, where Dickens' father was incarcerated for debt and the place where Nancy from *Oliver Twist* conducted her secret meeting with Mr Brownlow.

The walk is clear and easy to follow. It would be a wonderful way to spend an afternoon (or night perhaps) if you are a Dickens fan, and would still be a great way to see Victorian London if you aren't.

BANKSIDE 4

The model for the Land Securities Bankside 4 development in Holland Street will be on show in the Falcon Point Office at 56 Hopton Street from Monday 2 to Friday 6 August. The proposed development, which will have a high tower at the south end, is to replace the small industrial estate behind Tate Modern.

CHURCH DEMOLITION

Work on demolishing St Andrew's Church in Short Street, opposite the Young Vic, began last month. The church, was built in 1960 as a replacement for two nearby churches called St Andrew and St Thomas which were bombed during World War II. The church is being replaced by a Church Commissioners' development.

TIBETAN REPRIEVE

The Tibetan Buddhist Centre in Carlisle Lane has been given an extension to its lease till the end of March next year, thanks to St Thomas' Hospital. The centre was to close at the end of June to make way for the Founders Place development. £300,000 has already been raised towards the £500,000 needed for a new site.

NEW ARCHDEACON

Canon Michael Iprgrave is the new Archdeacon of Southwark succeeding the Venerable Douglas Bartles-Smith who retired last year. Canon Iprgrave, an expert on inter-faith relations, has served as a priest in Japan and the Leicester Diocese. He will take up his post in Southwark on 1 November.

review****Measure for Measure at
Shakespeare's Globe**

COUNT Vincentio (Mark Rylance), undergoing a mid life crisis, leaves the morally lax city of Vienna to find a purpose to life. He devolves his power to his cousin, the misnamed and puritanical Angelo, who asserts his new authority by invoking dormant laws against adultery and prostitution. So Claudio must die for making his fiancée Juliet pregnant. Shakespeare explores the challenge of mercy through the appeal of Claudio's sister, the pious Isabella, who pleads for his life, to Angelo who falls for her in spite of himself. As ever the Globe company reveals the joy of Shakespeare's language and the crowd loves the knowing remarks and teasing asides. A series of elaborate deceptions and substitutions frame the eternal moral dilemma of true justice and moral integrity in more elegant terms than today's tabloid headlines. In this pacy production a host of comic characters of bawds, prostitutes and brothel keepers reminds us we are really among the Bankside stewards.

Blackfriars Road**

ONCE a haunt of only the cognoscenti who had worked hard to locate its entrance round the corner from Southwark Station, Baltic is now a place to see and be seen. At lunchtime businessmen rub shoulders with journalists and 'ladies who lunch' in what looks like a chic and lofty converted barn. As lights dim in the evening, the volume builds up to a raucous but amiable cacophony as the beautiful people and city traders indulge in a bewildering array of vodka-based cocktails. The food is excellent, but moderately expensive: dinner for four with aperitifs, two courses, one bottle of Gavi di Gavi and coffee came to £160. You can order excellent beetroot-based dishes from Russian eatery, but the variety on offer from the Siberian Pelimeni (Small Dumplings Filled with Beef and Pork) to the Swedish Seafood salad to the quail with pomegranate will tempt you to be more adventurous. Staff are courteous and efficient.

**The London Wall
Project at City Hall**

SE1-based photographer Steve Hollingshead is launching his London Wall Project at City Hall with an exhibition of more than 300 small black and white prints displayed as a wall.

It represents the spirit, energy and diversity of the capital in a deliberately upbeat celebration of London life. Steve has needed enormous organisation, energy and patience to capture so many multi-cultural festivals, traditional ceremonies and demonstrations. Some of these events take place without huge crowds or any promotion but they are part of the rich living in London experience.

The Wall has some surprise SE1 bricks which reveal delightful corners and diverse events such as Daniel Deronda's film crew on Bankside, a Latin American procession at the Elephant & Castle and a view into a Thames barge from the Millennium Bridge. This growing wall should not be missed.

**Young Black Stallion
BFI London IMAX**

HERE'S a film quite up to children used to flat-out chases and special effects. This new production (PG) from Walt Disney is their first made expressly in IMAX format.

It's set in North Africa at the end of the Second World War and the vast screen of sand-dunes holds your attention with crystal clarity. The right human being is a little girl whose misfortune it is to be separated from her family and lost in the desert - until a black colt comes along and saves her...

She'll lose him before she finds him again and sets out to ride him in a race and win back her equine inheritance. Thankfully, she's found her family too, along the way.

Here, there are stunning desert scenes, shot on Namibia's Skeleton Coast and shown to great advantage on the vast IMAX screen.

The action practically kicks the sand in your eyes. At 50 minutes, it's a perfect film for the family.

Shops affected by Young Vic closure

THE closure of the Young Vic for rebuilding has left a gap in community life and a big gap in The Cut itself where its plays, actors and audiences were a constant source of creativity over 30 years.

The theatre has done an immense amount of work with local young people; they have run some memorable festivals and parties and latterly the Two Boroughs Scheme which meant people living in SE1 could go to the theatre for nothing.

And for those of us who love coffee and the papers, there was their little café where you could hide behind *The Guardian*, meet a friend for lunch or sit and watch the famous and not so famous go by.

The theatre has moved to Kennington and is on walkabout with their plays. The phone number remains the same and next month they will perform Tobias and the Angel at St John's Waterloo.

Meanwhile there is concern about the effect on local businesses whilst the Young Vic is closed. Some restaurants and shops are already reporting fewer customers and two years is a long time when you are on tight margins as many small businesses are now.

The Cut has many small shops. But unless we all make a big effort to support our excellent bookshops, electricians, china shop etc, it will be difficult for them to survive even with Kevin Spacey weaving his magic at the Old Vic at the other end of the street.

It would indeed be a tragedy if the temporary closure of the Young Vic meant the permanent closure of many of our well-loved local shops.


