Summer of open air music, theatre and dance

What better way to enjoy the summer than with free open air music, theatre and dance? There is plenty of all three on offer this month along the riverside.

The National Theatre's free outdoor Watch this Space festival returns from Friday 7 July to Saturday 2 September, featuring the best of British street theatre, bands from across the globe, breathtaking circus, late-night cinema, new work, installations, dance, cabaret, club nights and magnificent spectacle. With performances Tuesday to Saturday, Watch This Space offers more than 100 shows and events across its nine weeks. The action takes place in Theatre Square, the open space between the theatre and Waterloo Bridge.

Also this month the More Music series returns to The Scoop next to

City Hall, with lunchtime and early evening free open air concerts of all types of music. See page 4 for full listings.

The Big Dance is a week-long celebration of dance organised by the Mayor of London in partnership with Arts Council England. It runs from Saturday 15 July to Sunday 23 July.

As well as performances throughout the week at The Scoop, other highlights include an open-air dance class on the Millennium Bridge as part of a word record attempt. See page 2 for details.

The Coin Street Festival continues this month with weekends celebrating all things Brazilian and Turkish. These free events take place in Bernie Spain Gardens near the Oxo Tower. More information on page 3.

Away from the riverside there's also free music and entertainment in Lower Marsh and on the Millennium Green at the Waterloo Carnival on Friday 14 July. Turn to page 3 for details.

Thai Silk Southwark

Isabella Street is unsigned but better known as “the area behind Southwark Station” which has been greened during the past year by Ev occupying three railway arches. Now one of the adjoining units has been filled by Thai Silk from Waterloo Road.

The advantage of opening in Isabella Street is that it's traffic free and tables can be put outside. In the recent hot weather it has been busy.

The set lunch is £5.95 with a choice of four starters and seven main courses served with steamed Thai fragrant rice or stir-fried egg noodles with bean sprouts. Best of all service is not only very attentive for the price but speedy.

To begin I chose vegetable satay rather than chicken. My colleagues enjoyed vegetable spring rolls and sweetcorn cakes.

My Thai-style sweet and sour chicken was beautifully presented, especially the rice, and surprisingly filling. We also selected traditional Thai green curry with chicken and stir-fried pork with ginger and mushrooms.

The decor is simple and the room quiet. You soon forget the trains overhead. Our final bill for three with drinks was £24.

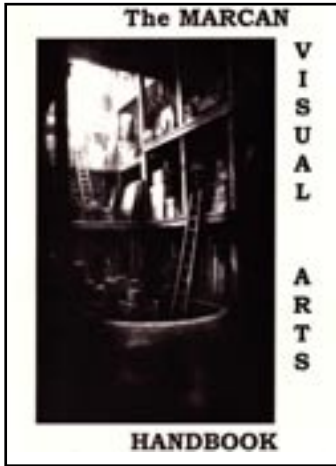

Peter Marcan, who has been based in Bermondsey with his special bookstore for just over fifteen years, has produced a definitive reference work which will have to be purchased by every library, college, newsroom and design studio.

There are almost 2,000 entries featuring professional organisations, specialist societies, guilds, networks, magazines and galleries.

Look up Poole Pottery and you find the new address and details helpful to a collector. But there is also an entry for the important but little-known Poole Printmakers.

There are surprising entries such as the Bear Museum (for teddy bears), the Corgi toy museum and the letterbox study group.

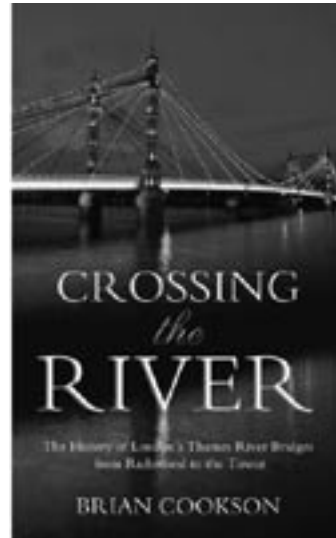
Many of the illustrations are supplied by members of the Bankside-based Royal Society of Painter-Printmakers.

Southwark has at least thirteen entries from the Historic Gardens Foundation to a specialist etching inks shop. Best of all this easy to use handbook has information which is not yet on the web.

Crossing the River

The Thames's bridges have been subject to detailed investigation before so it is a brave author who claims to be able to say anything new.

Brian Cookson, a tour guide, who has already written a book about London's waterways, here confines himself to the bridges from Richmond to the Tower.

With 350 pages there is unsurprisingly some padding provided by including the history of the surrounding areas.

He does however give a convincing argument against claims that the pineapples on the Lambeth Bridge obelisks recall the fruit being

grown at Lambeth. The first English pineapples were probably found upstream near Windsor.

But he does say that St George's Fields (south of Southwark Station) "was renowned for its vineyards".

Drama is provided by the story of the bus jumping the widening gap on Tower Bridge in 1952.

Pictures include George III's coat of arms from old London Bridge which is now part of the King's Arms in Newcomen Street, old and new London Bridge side by side in 1832 and the Lambeth crossing in 1866 as a suspension bridge.
